Mr. Chapman left Kansas in March 1908 and moved to Washington. He came to Freedom township, Phillips County in 1873 in a covered wagon so we lose one more old pioneer from our ranks. In 1908 he moved to Seattle and run a store there and has a nice home.

On May 28th he suffered a stroke from which he never rallied. A good kind husband, kind father and true friend has left us which will be sadly missed.

A telegram to Mrs. Iowa Halderman, Long Island, Kansas on October 21, from Seattle, Wash. telling us of the death of Anna Chapman. Mrs. Chapman was Anna Ferguson and they lived in the Iowa Union community until 1908 when they moved to Seattle where they have since resided. Anna and daughter and Stella Weeks were here in Kansas visiting friends one year ago in July.

About six months ago she took sick with rheumatism and heart trouble and was very sick at times. Her husband Will B. Chapman died in July, 1935. She leaves to mourn her loss: three daughters, two sons, grandchildren and great grandchildren, two brothers, John and Doc Ferguson all of Seattle and other relatives and friends. She was laid to rest by the side of her husband and mother in Washington.

Anna Chapman was a sister-in-law of Mrs. John Reece and Mrs. Iowa Halderman both of near Long Island, Kansas.

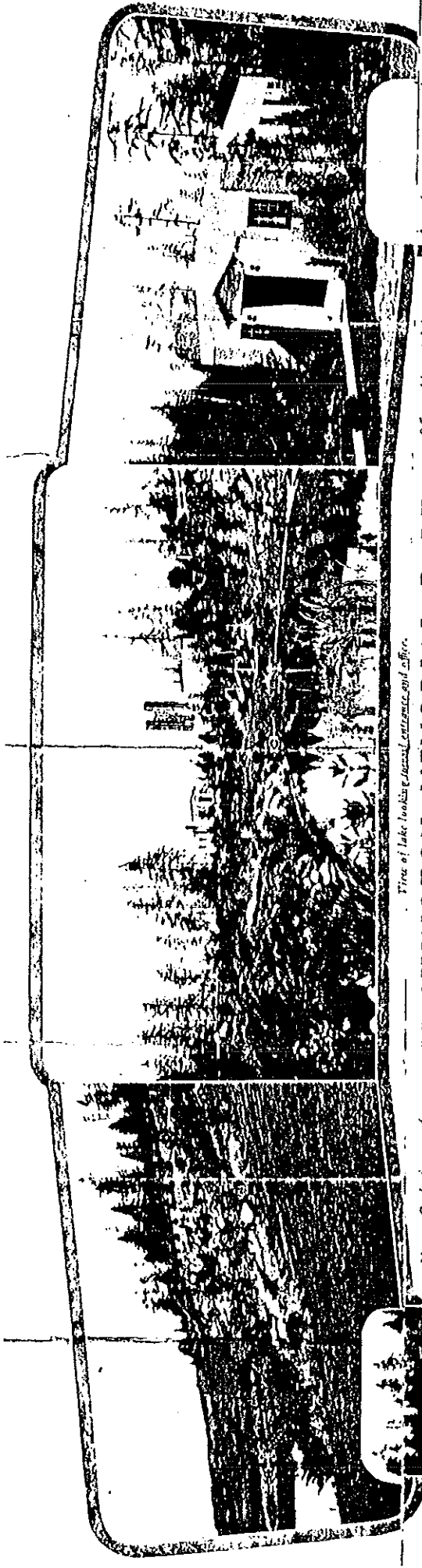

WILLIAM B. CHAPMAN NOTES

In 1908 Will Chapman and his family, wife and five children moved to the State of Washington, it was in the month of March, and upon his arrival there went into the business of running a store. The four eldest children were in school in the Phillipsburg area in 1905 as well as in the Angle Lake school in King County, Washington. Will homesteaded where the Hyatt house now stands, adjacent to Sea Tac Airport, and directly north of the old home is the Washington Memorial Cemetery, owned and developed by the Dunbar family. Will and others of his family bought in "early" to this cemetery when first developed and he and wife, Anna, and seven of their children and in-laws are buried there. Will was born in Fayette County, Iowa, and besides there, he lived in Linn County, Iowa, Phillips County, Kansas, and King County (Seattle area), Washington. He was a farmer and a butcher. Both he and Anna were Presbyterians. Will had a stroke 28 May 1935 which caused his death.

At time of this writing, in 1980, Annabelle Lockhart and "Mike" Arlon Chapman are living. She is a real doll and is traveling in Italy at the present time. Mike is recovering from a skull fracture that left him with impaired vision and hearing. A stick of wood flew up from the chopping block and "got" him. A lesser man would not have survived. He has gone swimming in Lake Washington every day, year round, for as long as I can remember. He also is or was an avid golfer. This has been a tough thing for him to cope with. It happened in March. He walks with a cane as he has poor balance. He wears an eye patch as he has double vision. He is the image of his Dad.

Merrie MacElquahm and Inez Hounsell were school teachers at a school in South King County. Anna Chapman had a big house and let rooms to teachers. Merrie stayed at the Chapmans. Inez had rooms in another home but the two girls were chums. When Owen Chapman came home on leave from the Navy, he and brother "Mike" double dated the school marms. The couples started out Inez and Mike - Owen and Merrie but by the end of the first date it was the other way around. This outcome became final by their marriages to each other.
