A CONCISE HISTORY OF EDWARD E. BARTLETT'S PAST 50 YEARS

The past fifty years of my life is a rather lengthy story so I will try to be brief and rewrite it enough to "boil" it down within reason.

As you may remember we left the old home place south-east of Kanorado in the fall of 1937. Economics I believe was the major cause for our move to greener pastures.

I secured employment at several jobs prior to the time of receiving that famous letter that said, "Greetings, you have been selected." Probably the most noteworthy job was my first job of that period, which was a year with the Kansas City Journal. This, an early day newspaper that at one time was associated with the Denver Post and was known as the Kansas City Post. That period was also my motorcycle days. We were not bold enough then to be the "Hells' Angels" of that era.

Now for the patriotic part - 4 years, 4 months and 19 days spent in Roosevelt's army training to kill and looking down our gun-sights trying to kill all those little yellow, slant-eyed bastards (?) that had "infiltrated" a considerable portion of the islands of the South Pacific Ocean. Well I am sure each of you in your area are as aware of who won the "War" as I am. I figure it Ain't over yet.

Well, I became acquainted with a very nice girl a while before I got that humorous letter from Roosevelt and when he declared that those who were "selected" for a year would have to stay with him for the "duration" we decided to get married. So we went to the local court house and got permission from them to do that. Anyway that took care of not having someone to write to after I started in the Grand Cruise of the South Pacific. Six months in Hawaii, a year in New Guinea and the rest of the time in Luzon, Phillipine Islands. I finally got back to Independence, Missouri, November 1st, 1945, with my dog-tags and sans "Purple Heart".

After about three weeks I decided to apply for a job somewhere - the second place I went to hired me on the spot and I spent 34 years and two months with them. That was the Butler Manufacturing Company of Kansas City. I worked at a variety of jobs in that time. Some of the more prolonged jobs were as production electrician, shear operator, press operator, welder and inspector. I was on inspection the longest of any job. For those that don't know what this company manufactured, it is primarily a fabricator of steel products for the "Agri-business" of the country. The most notable product most visible to the average person is all those BUTLER grain bins set up around so many of the farms of America.

Of note since the start of my post-war employment was the birth of our daughter Sandra Sue, born in 1946, then Lorna Louise, born in 1951, 1959 followed by David Edward, born in 1954. Besides these problems Ruth had the job as housewife. She worked as an assistant to a church nursery school for a short time. The founder of it moved on and she continued with the school for twenty-six years. Our girls married so we now have two son-in-laws and eleven grand-children. David has never married so for grandchildren his score is zero. The kids and grandchildren are now making mistakes like we did if not worse, you can tell them but they don't listen so it looks like whoever said history repeats itself was stating an eternal principle not just only stating a fact at a particular time.

Well, while I had my nose to the "grind-wheel" all those years it wasn't all work. I did get my private pilot "license" for single engine

land planes and thus got to enjoy a little of what I had for a long time wanted to do. However I have not built a plane as I want to do and at this late date probably won't get it done. Evidently other interests along with economics have intervened to bring all activity of this nature to a halt at present.

So starting in April of 1980 I "retired" at age 62. I stepped from the role of an industrial slave and with the assistance of a small pension along with being recipients of the now popular public welfare insurance program of F.D.R. we are now enjoying ourselves as wards of the state. The fact that Ruth and I are "notch year" babys along with a lot of other folks should be a worth while factor in keeping the federal debt lower than it would otherwise be.

The above fairly high-lights my activity for the past 18,250 days. Both of us are in tolerable health now for ones of our age and God willing we hope to see the light of many more days yet.

It is with the highest regard that I submit the above tale of my past for the edification of my dear fellow students of Kanorado High School. Please treat it kindly (I have made a copy of it). May God's blessings be with each and everyone in your remaining years of your sojourn on earth.

Local doctor celebrates 50 years in practice

July 1 marked the 50th anniversary as a doctor for Everett L. Saunders, who prides himself on having one of the oldest businesses on the Independence Square.

He began his practice in 1938 with Dr. Tom Twyman on the top floor of the old Crown Drug Store Building, on the northwest corner of the Square.

"People keep asking me when I'm going to retire," he said. "I tell them I retire every night."

Saunders, who will turn 74 on July 9, said the key to working so long is to take lengthier vacations each year. Not fond of the cold weather, each winter Saunders and his wife escape to Florida, where they enjoy fishing. Last year, the couple left in mid-December and didn't return until the beginning of March. The doctor said he is making up for lost time because when he was an obstetrician, there wasn't much time off. He estimates he delivered about 3,000 babies before he stopped in 1974.

He was the city physician from 1945 until 1980, when a city ordinance forced his retirement at age 70. Home from 2½ years in the military in 1945, Saunders said he was broke and all his former patients had found other doctors when he asked then-mayor Roger T. Sermon for the \$125 a month position, which also gave him inspection duties.

He continues his private practice at 121½ W. Lexington Ave., climbing a steep flight of stairs next to the Old Fashioned Ice Cream Place four days a week.

His office is filled with old family photos, awards, and newspaper clippings, like the one that tells the story of a busy June night back in 1937 when he delivered 10 babies.

There's a photo of his second wife, whom he first saw when he assisted another doctor in removing her appendix.

"I told her she had a cute appendix

— not an acute appendix, you understand," he said, laughing.

An old Coca-Cola machine, the kind that had miniature bottles, stands in the waiting room. Because the small bottles are no longer available, the machine carries cans, and has a sign directing people to pay the nurse for the soda. The price: 30 cents.

Saunders said a lot of people com-

ment on the antique atmosphere of his office.

"Most doctors offices make you feel like you're walking into a corporate headquarters — but I don't like that," he said.

Reflecting on his 50 years as a doctor, Saunders said, "It's been enjoyable — I still enjoy it or I wouldn't be doing it."

Dr. E.L. Saunders, longtime city physician, dies at 77

Dr. Everett L. Saunders Sr., Independence city physician for 39½ years, died Tuesday, Nov. 12, 1991, at St. Luke's Hospital. He was 77.

He practiced privately in Independence for 51 years, most of them in his second-floor office at 121 W. Lexington Ave. on the Independence Square. He retired in 1989.

"I used to kid him that if patients were able to climb the long flight of steps to get to his office, they really didn't need his care," joked Dr. James E. McConchie of Lee's Summit.

McConchie said he has known and worked closely with Dr. Saunders since 1947 when he arrived in Independence to practice radiology just down the street from Saunders' office.

"His skill in care and his dedication to his patients were remarkable," he said. "He was always available and tireless, staying very late almost daily to care for an overflowing waiting room of patients who walked up a towering staircase to receive care from a physician they loved and trusted."

Dr. Saunders was respected by his colleagues, McConchie said, and "his deep thoughts and practical judgments were key considerations in staff meetings at the old Sanitarium (now Indepen-



dence Regional Health Center)."

McConchie said Dr. Saunders thought each one of his patients was important and he always was cheery and pleasant to work with. He said his friend of more than 40 years was a family doctor in the "old country doctor sense."

In an Examiner interview in 1984, Dr. Saunders said he made house calls in his Model A Ford during the early part of his career. Those were the days when doctors had to use mustard plasters to treat pneumonia, he recalled.

He also boasted of delivering more than 3,000 babies during his medical career, which began in 1938 with Dr. Tom Twyman on the top floor of the Crown Drug Store Building on the Square.

After serving a 2½ stint in the Army during World War II, Dr. Saunders returned to Independence and resumed his practice on the Square. To make ends meet, he responded to an opening for a doctor to work for the city.

In a 1980 interview, Dr. Saunders recalled asking Mayor Roger T. Sermon for the job in March 1945.

"The mayor must have been glad to see me," he said, "because he gave me the job for \$125 a month."

He served in that capacity until 1984, when a city ordinance forced him to retire at age 70. He retired from his practice in 1989.

A longtime patient and personal friend, Marge Sackett, 4020 Blue Ridge Blvd., said that as a professional man, Dr. Saunders was without fault.

"He was taught by his parents never to overcharge and to help

the needy," she said. "He cared about people who were in need."

"As a personal friend, he played the meanest game of bridge I've ever seen. He was very competitive."

Dr. Saunders was a staff physician at the Independence Sanitarium from 1938 to 1989 and was president of the hospital medical staff in 1962. He was an Army physician during World War II.

He was a former member of the Jackson County Medical Society and the Missouri and American medical associations. He attended the Kansas City Junior College and was a 1937 graduate of the University of Kansas School of Medicine. He was a lifetime member of the KU Medical Alumni Association and a member of Alpha Omega Alpha.

He was a member of the Independence Masonic Lodge, the Royal Arch Masons, Ararat Shrine, the Knights Templar and the Jackson County Historical Society.

His survivors include his wife, Naida L. Saunders of the home; two sons, Everett Lewis Saunders Jr. and James Allen Saunders, both of Independence; two daughters, Nancy Steele, Philadelphia, and Evelyn Grist, Blue Springs; a brother, Clarence A. Saunders, Tucson, Ariz.; and 11 grandchildren.

Services will be 10:30 a.m. Friday at Newcomer's Noland Road Chapel; burial in the Blue Springs Cemetery. Friends may call from 6:30 to 8:30 tonight at the chapel, where Masonic services will be at 7:30. The family suggests contributions to the oncology department at St. Luke's Hospital.

Giver of life

Cadet uses CPR to save his dad's life

Scott Dutzel didn't know what to think when he turned around and saw his father making circles in the street with both hands raised above his head.

At first, Scott thought his father, Leonard Dutzel, was "catching flies." But after yelling to his dad and getting no response, Scott realized the seriousness of the moment.

Running down the driveway toward the street, the William Chrisman High School junior grabbed his father by the arm moments before he collapsed next to his truck parked in a Lee's Summit subdivision, where the two had been doing masonry work on a home under construction.

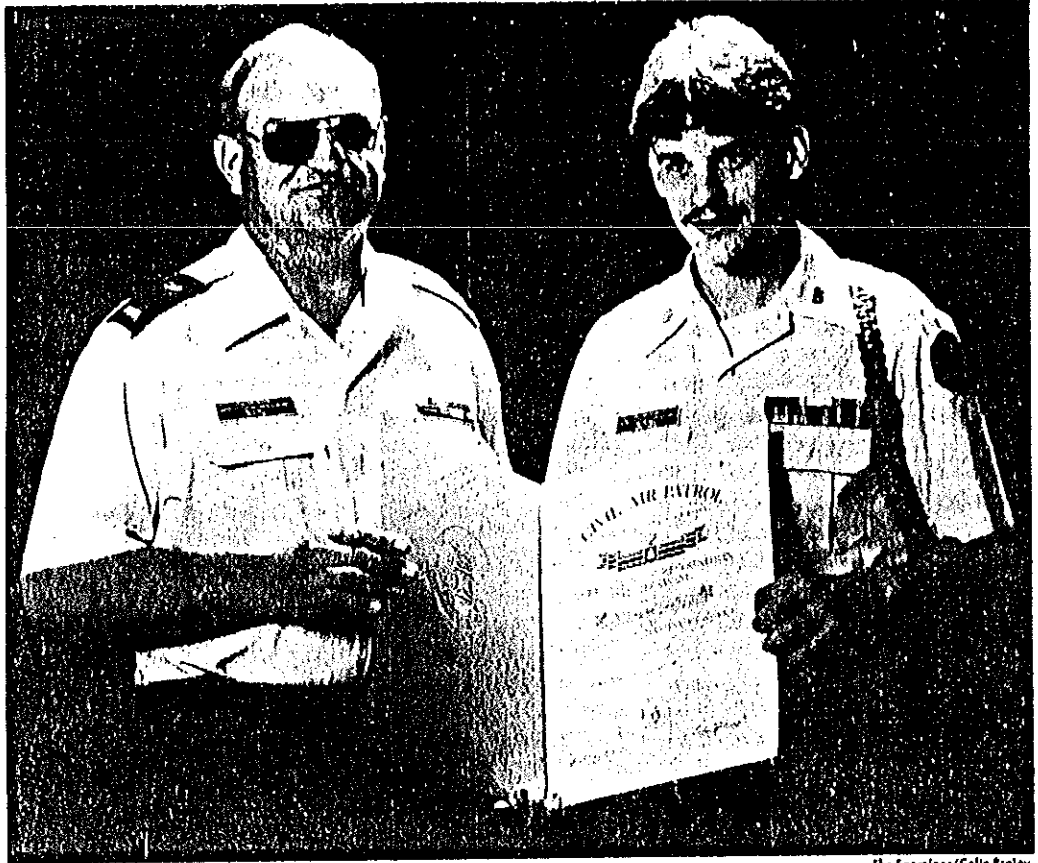
"At first, I didn't know what to do," says Scott, who was 16 years old at the time. (He celebrated his 17th birthday on Sept. 20.) "When he began choking on his spit, I turned his head so he wouldn't choke."

Before Scott had a chance to become too scared, he realized his 45-year-old father wasn't breathing. His bloodshot eyes were rolled back in his head. So with no one to turn to, he did the only thing he knew to do — administer cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

Scott, who learned CPR as a member of the Harry S. Truman Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol, got his father breathing again and is credited with saving his dad's life.

"If Scott hadn't been there," Leonard says, "I probably would have died."

Scott's lifesaving feat didn't go

unrecognized. On Nov. 4, he was honored for outstanding humanitarian service and presented with a Certificate of Recognition for Lifesaving from the U.S. Air Force Auxiliary.

The certificate was presented at the Civil Air Patrol Wing Conference in Jefferson City by Col. Joseph McMillan, wing commander.

Looking back on that day — Aug. 24, 1989 — Leonard recalls that as Scott was administering CPR, a Lee's Summit housing inspector drove by and called 911 from his truck.

But before medical help arrived, Leonard quit breathing again. Scott, assisted by the health inspector, again administered CPR and had his

dad breathing again before the emergency vehicles arrived.

Leonard, who is a first lieutenant in the Civil Air Patrol, was taken to Lee's Summit Hospital and later moved to the Independence Regional Health Center.

His illness was diagnosed as a "grandma seizure," which he says was triggered by a head injury suffered in July 1988. The accident occurred when he fell 18 feet and landed head first on a concrete floor, while doing remodeling work at an independence business.

Leonard, who lives with his wife, Sandra, at 614 E. Kansas Ave., said the Lee's Summit seizure was his first one. "I don't remember having the seizure. The next thing I

remember is waking up at the Lee's Summit Hospital."

When Leonard talks about Scott, one of his eight children, there's a sparkle in his eyes. "He's what I call a real good boy . . . I'm real proud of him."

Leonard says he wasn't prepared for what happened to him. "It just happened and I was surprised that he (Scott) was able to take care of the situation . . . that's why we train the (CAP) cadets so they'll know what to do in any case."

Leonard, who is taking medication for the seizure, hopes he never has another one, but if he does, and Scott is near by, he knows he'll be in good hands.

SAN MATEO COUNTY escapes worst

SAN MATEO — At 5:04 p.m. Wednesday, the tennis courts in San Mateo's Central Park were full. Earlier, there was a 2½-hour wait to get onto the San Mateo Municipal Golf Course at Coyote Point.

Phone lines were in operation, utilities were working and traffic along San Mateo County's highways and roads was flowing freely.

Exactly 24 hours after Tuesday's nightmarish earthquake San Mateo County resident seemed to be bouncing back.

While San Francisco's Marina district reeled in the wake of the deadly quake and subsequent fire while East Bay rescue crew desperately searched for life under the collapsed Interstate 88 freeway and while Santa Cruz County struggled to dig itself out from under its own devastation San Mateo County seemed to be back on its feet.

The blockbuster temblor has been, by and large, kind to the county.

No one is certain why the area escaped with just \$20 million of scattered damage, but there were some willing to take a stab at it.

"Modern building codes do work," said John Paquet, a structural engineer in Foster City.

Age. It has a lot to do with the county's resilience, agreed Don Biederman, a geologist who is director of math and sciences at Skyline Community College.

San Mateo County, he explained, was built up primarily beginning in the '40s and '50s after engineers, architects and government officials began to write earthquake safety into building codes.

"Most of the construction in the county is relatively new," he said. "Building designs are simply better and definitely engineered to survive a quake of this magnitude."

Ed Bortugno, a geologist with the Bay Area Regional Earthquake Preparedness Project, agreed.

He said building codes became even significantly tougher in 1977 after the big San Fernando earthquake a couple of years before. So newer construction is even stronger, he said.

"It also helps that San Mateo

RECISION OF MEMBERSHIP IN THE
REORGANIZED CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST OF LATTER DAY SAINTS
& REVOCATION OF JURISDICTION BY WAY OF ASSEVERATION

I, Edward E. Bartlett, a freeborn Freeman, having been born in Falls City, Richardson County, Nebraska, now a subject, ambassador and servant of Jesus Christ, God of Israel, do hereby state the following to be true and correct to the best of my knowledge and beliefs:

1. That on the 24th day of December 1939 I was baptized in accordance with the Holy scripture in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost as a prerequisite to entrance into the Kingdom of God. I was then confirmed as a member into the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. Said membership was entered in the church record at Independence, Missouri, February 1940 as number A66206.

2. Under threat of administrative censure and action this Asseverant deems an evaluation of legal jurisdiction necessary. Recognizing that membership within said institution obliges one to a voluntary compliance with its rules or laws which is good in as much as a member's belief is compatible, but which if it is not can result in a violation of a member's agency thru administrative compulsion to perform acts at variance with one's belief.

Therefore, Asseverant believing that his salvation in the Kingdom of God is contingent on his baptism unto Jesus Christ and not by membership in the institution known legally as the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints for the following reasons:

a. The Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints was initially incorporated in the county of Kendall in the State of Illinois, in harmony with an act of the legislature provided for the incorporation of religious bodies. Rejecting the common law right of freedom of association and to worship according to the dictate of their conscience in said act became subservant to the civil authorities and did in fact bow down to Baal.

Between the common law right afforded by the Constitution of the United States and privileges offered by the civil or babylonian law the founders of said church chose to organize upon the authority of the civil law. This act of incorporation was consummated when their documents were filed with the Recorder of Deeds of the above mentioned county on the 5th day of February, 1873.

Other acts of incorporation were made but these acts were also made under authority of civil law and only provide further evidence of the broadened coverage of the civil authority over said institution. Those who have given them the authority to exist do not represent God. Rather than that, they had only authority to grant the privilege to exist to those who voluntarily had put themselves under the jurisdiction of mortal men inhabiting the State of Illinois.

b. The Doctrine of Jesus Christ has not changed, neither will it change. Therefore the Church of Jesus Christ will be found the same today as it was before the 5th of February, 1873. An institution created by state legislature will change its laws (doctrine) as the civil legislature will direct from time to time. The most recent and obvious evidence of secular or civil control is found with the "document", Section 156 of the book, Doctrine and Covenants. Section 156 was submitted to members of the institution as representing "the mind and will of God." on April 3rd, 1984.

Being a creature of the state, the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, as a major and Equal Opportunity employer within the "region" therefore has an obligation to the civil authority to comply with their doctrine. They can in no way avoid it and hire only those of the male sex to fill the employee needs of the institution for they are now precluded by civil law from discriminating against a person's sex in the present Babylonian orientated society.

Before the document, Section 156, there was a problem. The Creator (civil authorities) had put an end to discrimination of employees because of their sex. This institution professing to have Jesus Christ as its head (Who knows if Jesus Christ cares whether females are discriminated against as employees or not ?) very obviously is subservient to another head, its creator, the civil government of the land. Listing to obey the commands of their creator, Section 156 was imparitive to create an illusion that it was God who desired that women must now occupy as ministers.

As a corporation the institution had no way to go but to comply with the will of that authority to which they owe their existence. While this is perhaps not the only example to be found that Jesus Christ is made to appear as head but is not or at best is only co-head of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. But it is sufficient evidence that the time is at hand that this Asseverant is confronted with the choice to remain as a worshiper of Baal or repent and worship and keep the commandments of the God of Israel, his Creator and Savior, who in the flesh is Jesus Christ of Nazareth. It is by this instrument that I assert by an expressed declaration what is my earnest intent to so do.

3. As the consequence of the above stated facts and the ramification of said facts upon my life style, I now declare my rescission of membership in the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and revocation of jurisdiction by power of contract of any nature with said institution as of the date of this instrument.

This Asseverant was casually advised at the time of his confirmation into said institution that he was now fully entitled to all the rites and privileges of membership. Such accommodations he has presumed to have enjoyed ever since the time of his confirmation. Because Asseverant was inexperienced in the matter of

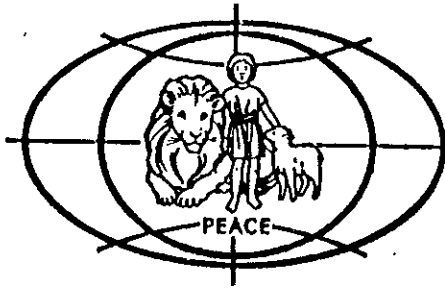

OBITUARY OF JOHN RUSSELL BARTLETT

John Russell Bartlett of 1538 North Main Street, Independence, Missouri, passed away Thursday, August 20th, 1970, during the Noon hour while being cared for at Resthaven Nursing Home, 1500 Truman Road in Independence. He had come to Independence in 1935 where he had worked at the trade of carpentering until his retirement in 1960.

He was born near Kanorado, Sherman County, Kansas, on October 22, 1894. While still very young he moved with his parents to South Dakota to live on a sheep ranch. He had served many years as Deacon, after which he was called to the office of Teacher and served many years in this office until the infirmities of body kept him from it. Also he was President of a quorum of Teachers, a responsibility he carried out until his recent illness.

Mr. Bartlett was united in marriage to Miss Velma N. Middleton on October 9th, 1921, by Elder Herbert Barto and the couple made their home on a farm to the southeast of Kanorado where they prospered until the early 1930s. It was following this time that the reverses brought upon them by the severe drouth, which prevailed upon the land for so many years, made it necessary for him to go elsewhere to provide for his family.

Adopted woman looks back on childhood

I have always known I was adopted. My parents chose to tell me when they thought I was old enough to understand, about five years old.

"Barbara," they said, "you are very special because you were chosen. Out of all the little babies, we chose you." Actually, they didn't choose me. I was chosen for them by the Social Worker. Mom and Dad put in their order for a baby girl, healthy, of course. Mom requested dark hair. As long as she had a choice, she could have at least requested curly, dark hair.

My adoptive parents were not exactly young when they decided to tackle adoption. Back then in 1951, thirty-five was too old to have a baby. Everyone told them it would be impossible to adopt a child because of their age and because they wanted a girl. There was an abundance of baby boys, but not girls. Nevertheless, they proceeded with their efforts to adopt.

After four years of waiting, filling out forms and passing the Good Parent Test, I finally arrived. I was just what they ordered; a healthy, dark-haired baby girl, with straight hair, of course. I could never understand why I have always looked like Dad's side of the family. I used to suspect I was really the daughter of an unmarried aunt, until I learned Social Workers try to match-up physical characteristics of adoptive parents and adoptees. I guess it was so I wouldn't look out of place and would fit in.

And fit in I did. Things were going great until I began hearing words like, "Don't you ever wonder about your 'real' mother?" "Don't you want to find your 'real' mother?" Did they mean the woman in the kitchen cooking dinner wasn't real? She looked and sounded real. I had touched her on many occasions and she felt very real.

Yes, I admitted, I had wondered about her. I wondered what she was like, if she had the same green eyes I did.

From then on, everywhere I turned I saw articles and books on adoption. My interest was aroused. I read

everything I could about children finding their "real" parents and vice versa. A headline in a local newspaper read: "Girl reunited with real mother after 30 years." The picture in the paper showed the girl and her real mother hugging and kissing, displaying an immediate bond between them. Surely, this was the natural order of things. My quest began.

The first and logical place to gather information was the birth announcements in the newspaper. I knew what my first name was, the birth date and time. It should have been easy to correspond that information to the birth announcement. After obtaining a copy of the birth announcements in the paper for Nov. 24, 1951, I discovered I was never born. There was no birth announcement listed that matched my first name and birth date. Either the birth date was wrong on my current birth certificate or I was illegitimate. Illegitimate births were not recorded in the paper. I decided to try something else.

Hospitals must keep records, I reasoned. Right I was, but only back about twenty years. Adoption agencies were absolutely no help. They frowned on giving out confidential information. What about adoption clubs, I thought. I found that the Adoptees Liberty Movement Association (AIMA) and Concerned United Birthparents, Inc. (CUB), are two very fine organizations for finding what they termed "lost" family members. It sounded like I misplaced my parents and I was now coming to claim them at the Lost and Found Department. These organizations are most helpful if you and the party you are looking for become members. Then the organization is able to "match up" the family members. I waited, but no one showed up to claim me. I tried other avenues as well; lawyers, private investigator and advertising in the newspaper: Wanted: Parents. No experience necessary! I received no response.

One night, while eating dinner at

Mom and Dad's house, I became ill. I was pretty sure it wasn't the stew. With severe pains in my back side, I doubled over. This was it I thought. I was going to die! Maybe my adoptive parents found out I was trying to locate my "real" parents and I was being punished for hurting them. I tried to make a deal with God and I would forget the whole thing. The pain got worse. My parents carried me to the car and away we went to the hospital.

When we arrived at the emergency room, I was sure I was going to die. There must have been twenty other ailing people in front of me. I knew that if we had to take a number, it was cash-in time for sure. The doctor finally came to examine me and told my parents my white blood count was dangerously high. My appendix was ready to burst. Within minutes, I was wheeled into the operating room.

After what seemed like only a short nap, I opened my eyes to see a nurse fussing about my room. "You know," she said, "you're a lucky girl. Any longer and you wouldn't be here now. And you know what else, you've got the nicest parents. I was talking to them while you were out. They were so worried about you. I can tell they love you very much." I smiled and asked the nurse to show them in.

When I saw my adoptive parents walk through the door, I thought of what the nurse had said. They were the most loving and kindest people you could ever meet. I saw the face of my mother with lines of worry adorning her forehead. Tears filled the blue eyes of a father I don't remember ever seeing cry before. Love generated from their faces. My mother sat by my side, took my face in her hands, and pushed back my straight hair. I wondered at that moment how any relationship with a woman I had never met could compare with what I already had with them. I was sure no "real" mother could love me more. The person I had been looking for was just a woman, not a mother, or at least my mother. These two people took me into their home, raised and loved me perhaps better than my "real" mother could love me more. The person I had been looking for

They gave me life, never denied me anything, within reason of course. They stayed by my side and were always there when I needed them. If that isn't "real" what is? I truly was lucky.

I never continued my search after that day. I never wanted to. Now when someone asks me, "Don't you want to find your 'real' mother?" I just smile and say, "I already did — 31 years ago."
