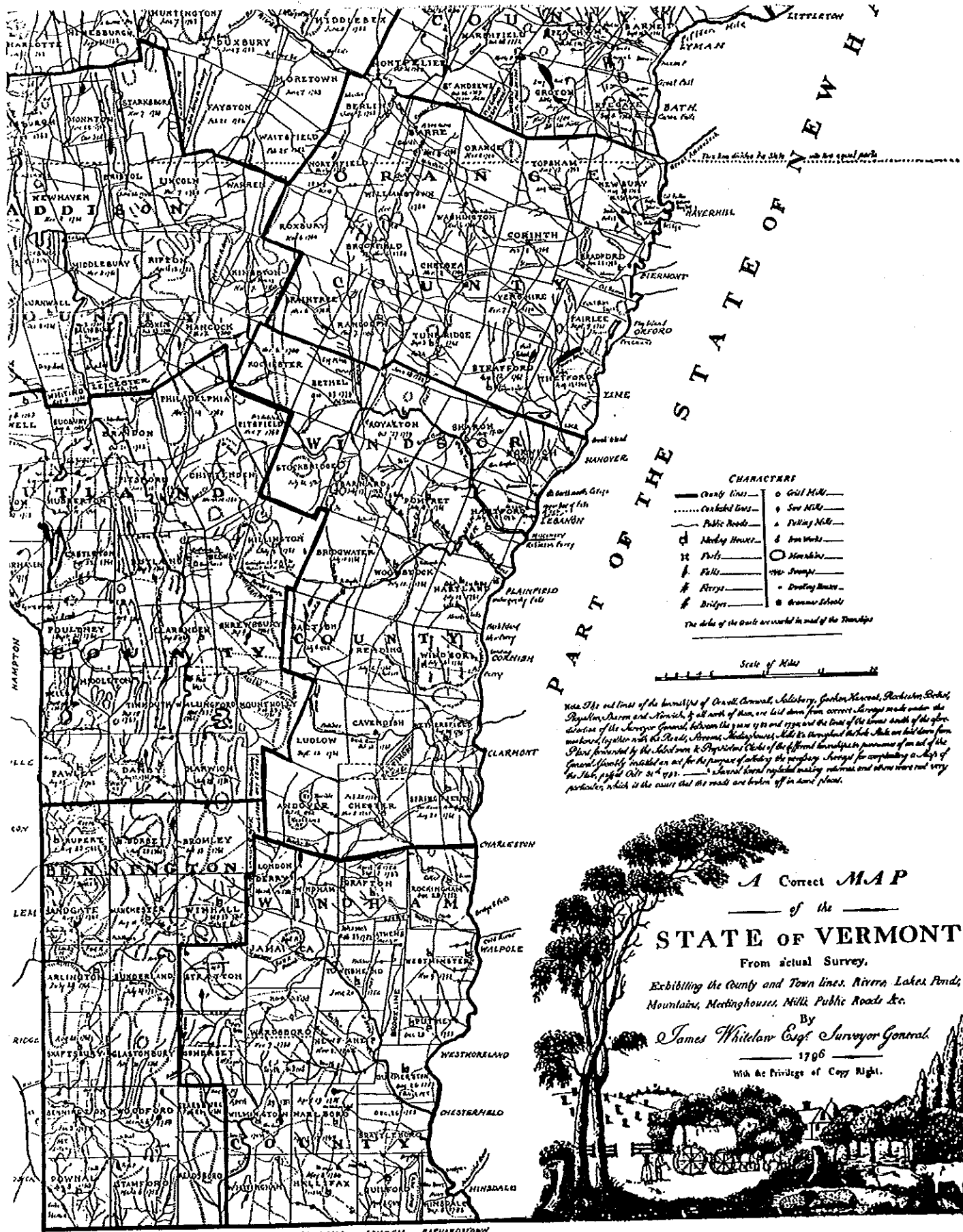

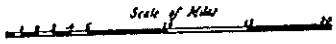

Note: The out lines of the township of Orwell, Cornwall, Salisbury, Grafton, Newcomb, Rockingham, St. Albans, Regent, Warren and Norwich, by all north of them, are laid down from correct surveys made under the direction of the Surveyor General, between the years 1792 and 1795 and the line of the town south of the above named town, together with the Roads, Streams, Meadows, &c. &c. throughout the State, are laid down from Plans furnished by the Selectmen & Proprietors of the different townships in pursuance of an act of the General Assembly, entitled an act for the purpose of settling the boundary Survey for completing a Map of the State, passed Oct. 20<sup>th</sup> 1795. Several local registered landowners returned and shown were not very particular, which is the cause that the roads are broken off in some places.

camped out eleven nights in going and returning. Mr. Harris made the return trip in four days. The teams from Middlebury and Cuyaboga Falls continued the transportation of stores to Perkins' camp until about the 20th of February, making their trip much more expeditiously after a road had been cut through and a path well beaten. The time of the drafting militia at Huron having expired about the first of March, those from the counties of Wayne and Knox, together with other south-eastern counties, were obliged to pass through the settlement at Harrisville, in returning to their homes. Mr. Harris often entertained companies of from ten to twenty at a time, and furnished them the best his scanty board afforded.

About the first of April, 1813, Jesse and Theophilus Cross came from Randolph to Harrisville to make inquiries, and search for their father, who, with his son Samuel, left Randolph sometime in the preceding December, with two loads of oats, drawn by six yoke of oxen, to dispose of them to the Pennsylvania volunteers. They learned at Canton that their father had disposed of his oats on condition that he would deliver them at Mansfield; and as he did not return, his friend at Randolph supposed he had gone on with the troops to Fort Meigs. Subsequently learning he had not gone in that direction, they on inquiry found out by Mr. Crawford, the landlord at Wooster, that they had staid with him over night on the 31st of December, and on New Year's morning started for Harrisville with seventeen head of cattle, which he purposed to feed during the winter on the corn he had purchased of the Corbins.

On the next morning after the arrival of the Crosses, they, in company with Mr. Harris and Geo. Burr, proceeded to search for the missing man—having strong

suspensions that they must have been in the neighborhood, from the fact that sometime during the month of the preceding January, some three or four head of stray cattle had come into the settlement. While prosecuting the search, and coming to the little Killbuck near the present site of James H. Moore's factory, they found where two yoke of cattle had been chained to saplins. At one place was found a yoke and chain, at the other the chain only; the cattle having probably managed to free themselves. Continuing the search in a south-easterly direction, to the vicinity of where Levi Chapman now lives, they found one yoke of oxen dead in the yoke. Appearances indicated that one of the oxen must have survived his mate sometime, having evidently drawn him about by the yoke a great distance. Here were also found the dead bodies of five or six head of cattle. At a little further beyond this point, appearances indicated that some one had evidently attempted to kindle a fire, small dry sticks having been collected for that purpose. Here was also found an overcoat, recognized as belonging to the unfortunate Cross, with fragments of other clothings, also a skull bone. The remains were brought into the settlement and buried. The supposition in relation to this sad calamity, was, that coming up from Wooster through the wilderness, he got beighted in the neighborhood of the Little Killbuck; that he there chained up a part of his cattle and undertook to come into the settlement, but being unacquainted with the location, and a severe snow storm prevailing at the time, he lost his way, and perished from cold and exposure, together with his son, and were mangled and devoured by beasts of prey.

In February, 1814, Russell and Justus Burr removed with their families, from Litchfield county, Connect-

ministers of the Baptist, Methodist, Episcopalian and Universalist orders often held meetings in the township, as early as 1816. In 1818, Somer Griffin, with his wife, six sons and one daughter, moved into the township, also Reuben Chapman with his sons Levi, Perrine and Leonard, Captain Ed Harris and family, David Sausman, Mordica Tracy, Stephen Harrington, with his sons Reuben, Benjamin and Weava Harrington. The first death in the township occurred in the person of a child of George Burr in 1817. Doctor Barnes preached the funeral sermon, being the first funeral service performed in the township. The first adult that died in the township was Hulda the wife of Stephen Harrington. She died in 1818. The first birth in the township was a daughter to George and Mehetable Burr, in the spring of 1815. The first male born in the township was Alpha, son of Justus Burr, now of Illinois.

The first wedding in the township was celebrated in November 1816. The parties to it was Levi Holcomb and Laura Marsh. There being no clergyman or Justice of the Peace in the township to solemnize the marriage contract, Mr. James Rogers, who still lives in the township distinguished now as then for his disinterested philanthropy in matters of that kind generously volunteered his services to procure the so much needed official dignity. Setting out on foot, like Japhet in search of his father, he bent his course towards Wadsworth. Arriving there he made application to Esq. Warner, who readily assented to come out the next day and legalize the ceremony. It being near sundown Mr. Rogers, at the request of Mr. Warner, consented to tarry over night and accompany him to Harrisville the next day. But alas! how precarious are all human calculations, for during the night Esq.

Warner was taken so severely ill, that it was quite impossible for him to fulfil his engagement. Here was a dilemma. The wedding was set for that very night, and no one yet secured to perform the ceremony: but Mr. Rogers, whose perseverance was only equalled by his philanthropy, true to his purpose as the needle to the pole, pushed on to Esq. Van Heinans in Norton township. The Esquire, who as it would seem, must have been a lineal descendant of Nimrod, was out on a deer hunt, and did not return until night, when he very ungraciously informed Mr. Rogers that he was not at his service. This to most men would have been a settler. Not so to Rogers, these reverses and setbacks only stimulated his zeal the more, for on learning that there was a Justice of the Peace in Coventry, he immediately proceeded thither, secured the services of an Esquire Heathman, and arrived at Harrisville the next day after the wedding—should have been.—However the affair was closed up that evening, and the parties are now living in Michigan. This is supposed to have been the first wedding in the county.

The first frame building in the township was a thirty by forty foot barn, erected by Russel Burr, in 1816, and soon after, in the same year. L. Holcomb built another in the west part of the township.

James S. Redfield brought into the township, in 1820, the first stock of dry goods and groceries. In 1826, Redfield and Chapman sold goods in company. In 1828, a store was opened by Barker and Siza, and in 1830, another by Archibald Miles and Charles R. Deming. Since that time, J. Higbee and the Ainsworths have been the principal merchants at the center of the town.

In settling a wilderness county, even those who have not experienced its trials and privations: can easily per-

ing whenever Redfield set him down and attempted to make him walk, which Redfield says he very soon made him shut up by cuffing his ears. Judge Harris relates that being in company with Loamm Holcomb, about Christmas, in 1817 or 18, and in the vicinity of Campbell's Creek, in the township of Westfield, he there counted twenty-seven wolves in one drove. In 1818, a grand wolf hunt was projected by the townships of Westfield, Lsfayette, Chatham, Spencer, Homer, Mountville, Guilford and Harrisville, for the purpose of destroying and driving out those troublesome beasts, but as it is reported that no wolves were captured, the inference of the writer is that the benefit that accrued if any, must have been in the driving out process. However there is no doubt but that while no wolves were caught, many deers were, which with the excitement attending festivities of that character fully reimbursed the hunters for the fatigues of the day. Many of the early settlers are still living in Harrisville, among whom may be mentioned Judge Harris, George Burr, James S. Redfield, Timothy Burr, Albert Harris, who was a small child some two years of age, when his father settled in the township, also, Carols Tuttle, James Rogers, Lomer Griffin, Levi Seva, Perrin and Leonard Chapman, Ebenezer Munson, Willis and Ralzaund Griffin. One notable fact of all others, and one which I am led to think has not a parallel in the history of many townships, is that of the four persons which consituated the first family in the township, all at the end of nearly half a century are now living in the township. They are Joseph Harris and wife, Albert Harris and James Redfield.

ceive that the life of a prisoner cannot be one of entire idleness and inactivity. Roads have to be opened, farms cleared up, buildings erected; all this requires energy and perseverance. So it was in Harrisville. Roads had to be opened leading to Medina, Wooster, North to Elyria, East to Middlebury. Some were done by legislative appropriations, and some by voluntary donations. The road leading to Medina was a state road, for the opening of which the Legislature made an appropriation. James S. Redfield, in the spring of 1816, took the job of chopping out the road from the center of the town to the south west corner of Medina, and for making fifty-seven rods of bridges and causeways, and finished it about the first of September. Mr. Redfield says that the first loaded teams that passed over the road were those of Josiah Perkins and Titus Stanly, then moving into Harrisville.

The early settlers experienced much trouble in protecting their hoes and sheep from the ravages of bears and wolves, which infested the woods in great numbers; and many are the anecdotes related in relation to their encounters with them. James S. Redfield caught, in a period of a very few years, one hundred and twenty-two wolves, on which he received a bounty of—dollars each. Wolves, as Davy Crocket would say, are naturally a sneaking cowardly *canine*, seldom attacking persons unless compelled by hunger. Mr. Redfield relates that having caught one in a steel trap by the end of the toe, and tearing that in its struggles it would get its foot out of the trap, he pounced upon it, put the foot of the wolf into the trap and carried it into the settlement. This wolf it would seem, was almost as passive as was old Put's, when he applied the torch to its nose, for it offered no resistance, nor manifested any viriouness except growling and snarl-

sell Burr, "a square crop off the right ear." Five more were recorded in this year; two in 1817; one in 1818. Then follow records every year up to the year 1865. A complete political organization of the township was effected in April, 1817, and the new township then included all the territory which now belongs to the townships of Harrisville, Westfield, La Fayette, Chatham, Spencer, Huntington, Rochester, Troy, Sullivan and Homer. Twenty-nine votes were cast at the election held for township officers on October 6, 1877, at the little schoolhouse erected in the spring of that year. The poll sheet of this election has been lost, but the following were elected as township officers for the ensuing year: Joseph Harris, Loammi Holcomb and Isaac Catlin, Trustees; Isaac Catlin, Justice of the Peace; and Timothy Burr, Township Clerk. The first is a list of the taxable property of Harrisville Township, made out by Willey Hamilton in the spring of 1819. There are eighty-one names listed, and their personal property comprises 49 horses and 211 neat cattle. This included territory north, east and west, other than what constitutes Harrisville Township to-day, although at that time it all came within its political boundaries. The next election occurred in Harrisville on the 12th day of October, 1819, at which time, State, county and township officers were voted for by the Harrisville people. Thirty-nine votes were cast at this election. At one of the township elections in the early years, forty-seven candidates were voted for, though there were but thirty-one votes cast. This included all the different township offices, such as Road Supervisor, Overseer of the Poor, Fence Overseer and "Ear-mark" Recorder. Some of the candidates had the honor of receiving ballots for four and five different offices. From this, it may be inferred that there was as much strife for office among our forefathers as there is among the politicians of to-day. This is again well illustrated at a special election held on July 3

following, to elect two Justices of the Peace. Twenty-nine votes were deposited, and they were divided among eleven candidates, as follows: Waynewright De Witt, 23; Leonard Chapman, 24; Elijah De Witt, 2; James Rogers, 2; William Burr, 1; Amos Witter, 1; Joseph Harris, 1; Jonathan Fitts, 1; Lomer Griffin, 1; Carolus Tuttle, 1; and Ebenezer Harris, 1. The names of the voters at this election, the first Presidential held in Harrisville Township, were Aaron Loomis, Reuben Chapman, Arvis S. Chapman, Joseph Harris, James Rogers, Seeva Chapman, Cyrus Chapman, Loammi Holcomb, Carolus Tuttle, Timothy Burr and Levi Chapman. At the next spring election, forty-seven votes were polled. This increased, at the election on April 7, 1828, to fifty-six. During the fall of that year, the people of Harrisville were thoroughly aroused in the Presidential canvass that was being waged between Andrew Jackson (Democrat) and John Q. Adams (National Republican). Sixty-five citizens came out that day for the Adams Electors, and one solitary vote had been cast for Andrew Jackson. Then indignation arose. Who could have been the traitor in their midst, who had presumed to vote for Andrew Jackson and the Democratic ticket? When it was suggested by Waynewright De Witt that the man who had presumed to vote the Democratic ticket should be rewarded by a free ride on a rail, and the scorn of the entire colony, Josiah Perkins arose and defiantly declared that he had been the man; and intimated to the suggestor of the free ride that he was ready, right then and there, to sustain the virtue of a free ballot with a little more forcible argument than mere words. But it did not go further than words, and the political excitement soon subsided, and pleasant good feeling was restored. At the Presidential election held on November 2, 1832, 86 votes were cast. The Henry Clay Electors (Whig) received 45 votes, and the Andrew Jackson Electors (Democrat)

ing, and for several years after that, Mr. Timothy dealt instruction in the rudimentary branches of learning to the few children, numbering from four to eight at a time.

A few years later than this, another school-house was put up by the few settlers in the western part of the township, on the site where now one of the churches at Cherry Corners stands. Miss Harriet Hosford taught there a few terms, and also a Mr. George McQuay. A division of the township in school districts was made on the 10th of October, 1827, with the following boundaries, as given in the original ordinance made by the Township Trustees:

Commencing on the south line of the township, at the southeast corner of Lot No. 156, running from thence north on lot line, to the north corner of Lot 96; from thence west, on the line of the lots, to the West Branch of Black River; from thence northwardly, following said stream, to the outer road running east and west; from thence west, to the west line of the township. All that said part of said Township west and south of that line, shall constitute District No. 2. District No. 3, bounded by District No. 2 on the west, and a line running from the northeast corner of Lot 96, running east to the south, to the southeast corner of Lot 87; from thence north, to the northeast corner of Lot 68; from thence east, to the east line of said township; said district shall include all that part of the Township south and east of the said line not included in District No. 2. District No. 1 to contain all that part of the Township not included in the other two districts. The following are the names of all the householders in District No. 1: Seth Lewis, Michael Loomis, Alvin Loomis, Justus Burr, Carolus Tuttle, John Jason, Jr., Nedebiah Cass, John B. Utter, Charles Lewis, Lomer Griffin, Willis Griffin, Anson Loomis, James Rogers, Amos Kinney, Timothy Burr, Joseph Harris, Thomas Dunbar, Eli Utter, Michael Simcox, Cyrus Chapman, Henry K. Joline, Asher Loomis, Ira Kingsby, Elijah De Witt, Isaac Catlin, Diodema Birge, John Jason, Moses Parsons, Ralzemond Griffin, Parley F. Griffin, Richard West and Perrin Chapman. District No. 2—Loamm Holcomb, Reuben Harrington, Daniel Delevan, Timothy Munson, Josiah Perkins, John Munson, Nathaniel Rogers, Leonard Chapman, Samuel R. Munson, David Sausman, Roger Phelps, William Rogers, Perez Rogers, Anson Marsh,

Jonathan Fitts and Thomas Holcomb. District No. 3—Thomas Russell, Russell Burr, Webster Holcomb, Jeremiah Hill, Elijah Bishop, Levi Chapman, Warren Johnson, Soeva Chapman, Orange Stoddart, Reuben Chapman, Isaac Rogers, Ebenezer Harris, William Burr, George Burr and Celina Young.

An enumeration taken on the 4th of January, 1830, of the householders in the different school districts in the township showed eighty-one householders and one hundred and thirteen children between the ages of four and eighteen. Another subdivision of school districts was made on the 16th of May, 1835, adding two more and making five school districts. Two more districts were created by the township trustees, on the 15th of May, 1837, and on the 9th of October in the same year, Alvin Loomis, Joseph W. Rockwell and O. S. Kinney were appointed Directors of School District No. 1. An enumeration of the youth between the ages of four and twenty, in the several school districts in the township, taken on the 20th of October, 1838, showed 253 males, 253 females and a total of 506. This number had increased in 1840 to a total of 538, and in 1845 to 638. In 1855, the number of youth had decreased to a total of 484, and in 1860 there were only 447 children between the ages of four and twenty years in Harrisville Township. Twenty years later, in the fall of 1880, the total number of school children between the ages of six and twenty-one, in the entire township, including the special school district of Lodi, was 482, being, strange as it may seem, just 156 less than were enumerated in 1845.

By virtue of an act passed by the Ohio Legislature on April 9, 1867, a special school district was created in the winter of 1868, embrac-

came to Hulburt's house from Harrisville, and, after a short stop, hastened northward. One of them was remarkably intelligent. Both went armed to the teeth, fully prepared to fight for their liberty against large odds. A colored brother in distress slipped into the house one night in 1850, in the dead of winter, whose feet were frozen and full of gravel, a pair of fine boots stolen from his former master, being too badly cut and worn to be of any service or protection. This man was bound for Detroit, and he got there in good time. In 1859, an entire family of fugitives (father, mother and five children) spent one night at Hulburt's. So fearful of danger were they, and so timid, even in the house of a true friend and a fearless defender, that they all insisted on sleeping in the same room. No amount of persuasion or assurance of security could induce the father to have any member of his family even beyond the reach of his protecting arm.

From the records of the older churches many interesting items of township history can be gleaned. A Baptist Church was regularly chartered in 1835, the original incorporators being Joshua Bailey, Rufus Freeman, Levi Chapman, William Hulburt, John Mead and a few others. William Hulburt was chosen first Clerk, and was continued in the office through almost the entire life of the organization, Mr. L. D. Ellis serving the final term. Rev. Rufus Freeman was the first Pastor, and preached occasionally until the church's death. Other Pastors filled the pulpit as follows: Rev. D. A. Randall, 1840-42—since quite noted as an author; Rev. J. Manning, 1842-45; Rev. Thomas E. Inman, 1846-49; Rev. J. G. Edwards, 1850-51; Rev. J. H. Collins, 1852. After 1852, there was no preaching, except now and then by Rev. Freeman, and, in 1858, the church died, its dismemberment caused by differences on political subjects.

The first Congregational Church and Society was incorporated by an act passed February 21,

1834, and articles were issued to Enoch Stiles, George Collier, Ebenezer Fowler and Noble Stiles. The society was organized April 7, 1834. First officers: Ebenezer Fowler, Moderator; Sylvanus Jones, William Henry and Calvin Onapin, Trustees; William Russell, Secretary; Enoch Stiles, Treasurer; Benjamin Kidder, Collector; Rev. John McCrea, Pastor, up to June 1, 1834. On June 1, 1834, Rev. Joel Goodell "commenced preaching half of the time for one year." A meeting was held in the town hall at Le Roy, November 19, 1835, at which Noble Stiles offered a donation of land, lying north of the west half of the public square, and it was voted to build a church. Three weeks later Noble Stiles, George Collier and Thomas J. Dewey were appointed a building committee and went to work. April 4, 1836, this committee was instructed to build a basement story, inclose the body of the house, and proceed with the tower as far as the funds on hand would warrant. All these things were done promptly. August 14, 1837, Rev. Asaph Boutelle was offered and accepted \$150 for his services as Pastor for the ensuing year. Rev. William B. Ransom preached in 1839, his term ending January 2, 1840. Rev. O. Littlefield preached one year, beginning November 7, 1841. In 1843, on the 1st of June, Rev. J. P. Stuart, a talented and eloquent, but eccentric man, commenced to preach, under an engagement for one year; but, at the end of ten months, he was dismissed at his own request. The spring of 1844 found Stuart at the head of a large company of Westfield enthusiasts, some of them members of his former flock, who went to the banks of the Ohio River, in Belmont County, and started a community on the Fourier system. This colony lived less than one year.

More than ten years passed in which the Congregational Church maintained but a feeble existence. Finally, on the 29th of May, 1859, formal steps were taken to enter the Methodist Episcopal Conference, and the transformation

unable to make much headway, and sank to be seen no more. At the time of the accident, his father and mother were on the bank of the lake, and saw their son go down, but were unable to render him any aid.

Samuel Hutchings, a native of the State of New York, came to Portage County, Ohio, in 1833, and from thence to Michigan in 1837. The date of his land entries on Sections 32 and 33 is October 1, 1835, but he did not make a permanent settlement until 1837. He came from Ohio to Newberg with two yoke of oxen attached to one wagon, bringing with him his family and household goods. His experiences as a pioneer were the same as all those who emigrate to a new and undeveloped country, must necessarily pass through. Of his children now living, Nelson A. and Harriet J. are in Newberg, the former on the old homestead; Charlotte A. and Martha, in St. Joseph; Flora M., in South Haven, and Marvin C. in Washington Territory.

Samuel Eberhard, a native of Pennsylvania, came with his parents, David and Susan Eberhard, to Crawford County, Ohio, in 1826, where he remained ten years, and from thence he came with his parents to Porter Township, where his father entered land and remained one year. The date of his settlement in Newberg is 1837. His father moved from Ohio to Michigan with ox teams, having four and sometimes six oxen attached to the wagon which was loaded with 1,600 pounds of household goods, provisions for the journey and other effects. His father also brought with him ten head of cattle and a number of sheep. There was such a plentiful supply of wild game in the forests when they came that, during the year they lived in Porter Township, they purchased but fifteen pounds of pork of John Bair, paying him twenty-five cents per pound. In the fall of 1836, Samuel's success as a hunter was established. He, in eighteen successive days, killed forty-five deer with what he terms his "pillock" rifle.

During the winter of 1836-37, he and his father constructed their first log cabin in Newberg Township, on Section 22, and in the spring of 1837 moved into it, and from that time until the present Samuel has been a citizen of this township. The hewed logs of this cabin are in a sound condition and may be seen to-day in a log stable on Section 23, where Samuel now resides.

In the spring of 1847, while engaged in planting corn, Samuel's hoe struck on some object which, at first, he thought to be an old root, but on closer examination it proved to be a roll of clay, which on being broken open was found to contain an Indian's calumet or pipe of peace. It was constructed in such a manner as to perform the double office of pipe and

tomahawk. What lends greater interest to this instrument is the ingenious way in which the copper edge is let into and welded to the iron blade. The method of uniting copper and iron was known to the ancients, but may now be classed among the lost arts. This pipe is now among the archives of the Pioneer Society at Cassopolis.

Rachel and Betsey Eberhard, sisters of Samuel, were the first interments in the Poe Cemetery. Rachel deceased the 7th of May and Betsey the 14th of the same month in 1838.

Hiram Harwood, a native of Vermont, emigrated to New York and from there to St. Joseph County, Mich., in 1831. He and his family, accompanied by Gard Sickles and family, came with teams by way of the Erie Canal and the lakes to Detroit, and thence across the southern part of Michigan to Three Rivers, where Hiram Harwood made his home for six years. The country around Three Rivers at this time was sparsely settled, there being only one log house where Three Rivers now stands. He lived in a trader's bark shanty the first winter, his table being an old chest, and very often his scanty meal consisted of nothing but potatoes and salt, and this condiment cost fifteen cents per pound. He entered his land in Newberg, January, 1837, on Section 24. Here, on the banks of what is now known as Corey Lake, he erected his log cabin. Joshua Corey had settled on the same section the year previous, and he was the only neighbor residing within three miles, and Three Rivers was his nearest trading-point. With the early history of the township he was intimately identified, as will be seen by reference to its civil list. He was a man of great fortitude, seldom changing his opinions and plans when once formed. He was a pensioner of the war of 1812. His remains with that of his wife sleep in the Corey Burying Ground. Of the children now living, Nathan and Silas are living in Newberg, the former on the old homestead, and Daniel A., in St. Joseph County; Mailla A., Sarah A., and Betsey are deceased.

Myron F. Burney, son of Thomas Burney, came with his father to this township when two years of age, and has lived here ever since. He is a respected citizen and lives on his farm on Section 7.

Peter Harwood, a native of Wayne County, N. Y., arrived with his family in Newberg in 1842, and settled on Section 25, being the first settler on that section. His son, William M., resides on Section 16, where he has a fine farm under a good state of cultivation. He is spoken of as one of the progressive farmers of the township. Peter Harwood and his wife Mary (Averill) were interred in the Corey Lake Cemetery.

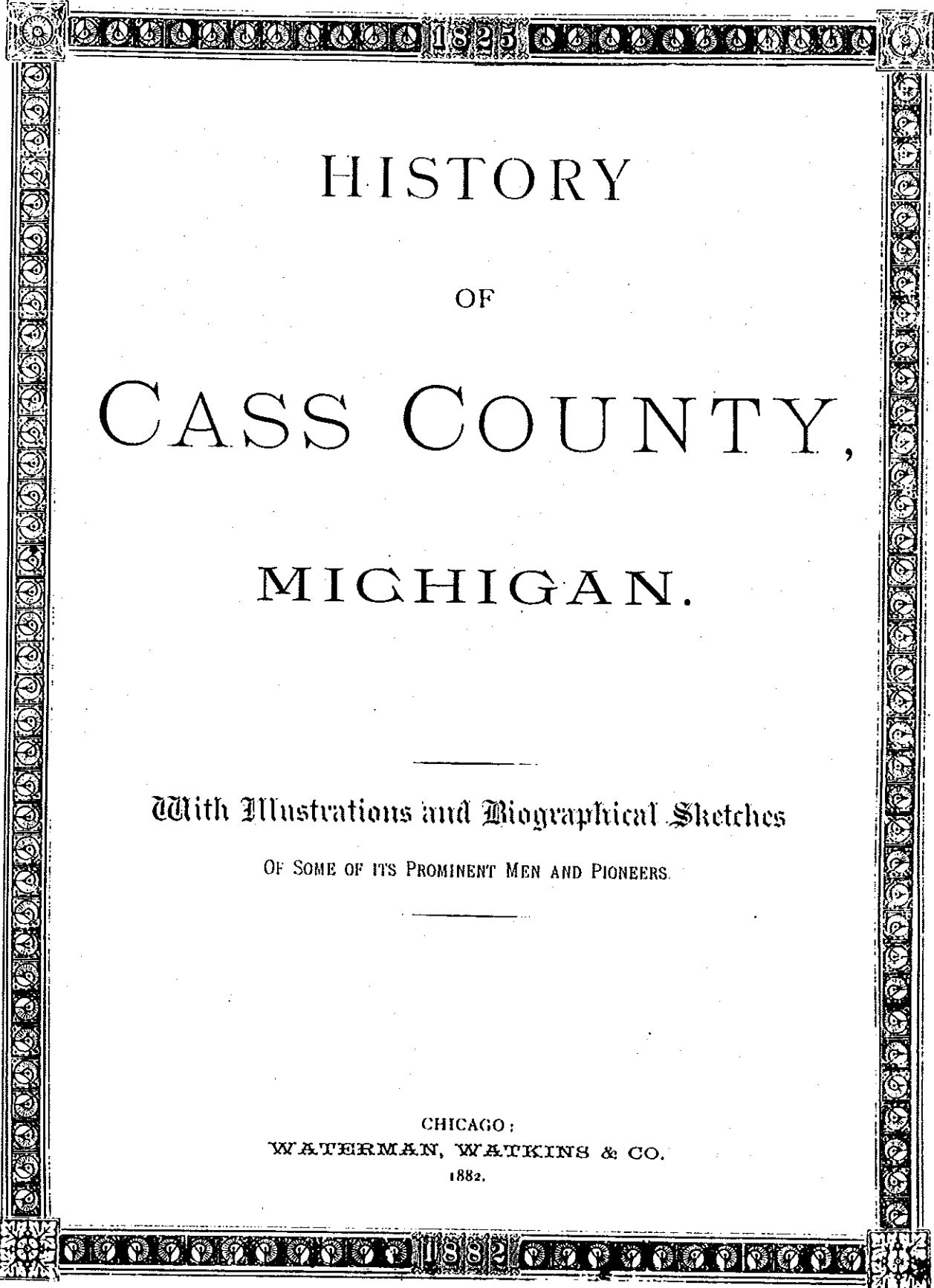

## METHODIST PROTESTANT SOCIETY.

The Newburg Circuit of the Methodist Protestant Church was detached from the St. Joseph Circuit, and organized into a separate one, October 15, 1869. The organization meeting was held at the Corey Lake Schoolhouse, Rev. Whitney Hough being the preacher in charge, and David P. McKee, Secretary.

The circuit consists of six classes, as follows: Victory and Newberg Center, of Newberg Township; Watkins, Mount Desire, of Fabius and Bent, of Flowerfield Township, St. Joseph County.

The following pastors have served on this circuit: Revs. Whitney Hough, William Kelley, Samuel Phillips, Mr. Newell, R. S. Moulton, J. P. Goodrich, and Samuel Reeves, the present pastor. Present church membership, 174. Having no house of worship, services are held at schoolhouses and in the Town Hall.

## BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES.

## JAMES M. CHAPMAN.

James M. Chapman, while he is not one of the earliest settlers of Newberg, has for nearly forty years been prominently identified with all the material interests of the township. He was born in Harrisville, Medina Co., Ohio, February 3, 1818. He was the son of Levi and Lucinda (Turner) Chapman, both natives of Vermont, from whence they came to Ohio about 1817. They were married in Vermont, and at the time of their emigration had three children, two of whom, Scelina, now Mrs. Thomas Birney, and Amery, are residents of the county, the former living in Marcellus, the latter in Newberg. James received a good common school education, which he made practically useful to himself and others by teaching.

In 1843, he was married to Miss Mary Haggerty, of Oneida County, N. Y., where she was born in 1825. After their marriage, Mr. Chapman engaged in business, but, meeting with a serious misfortune (the loss of his property by fire), he decided to come to Michigan and begin life anew.

In May, of 1844, he and his young wife started for Cass County, with their worldly effects loaded in a wagon drawn by a team of horses. They arrived safely at the residence of his brother-in-law, Thomas Birney, with whom they remained until the following August, when he removed to the farm where he has since resided, and which at the time was in a state of nature. There were no roads in this part of the township at the time, and his nearest neighbor was two miles distant. The pioneer life of Mr. Chapman was replete with toil and privations, the land was heavily timbered, and the construction of a farm was a work of great magnitude, but by degrees field after field was added to the "little hole in the wilderness," and industry and perseverance were rewarded. He now has a valuable farm of 200 acres. Mr. Chapman has taken an active interest in all measures tending to the advancement of the interests of Newberg, and has occupied many positions of trust and responsibility. For eleven years he has represented Newberg upon the Board of Supervisors, where he was recognized as an able and efficient member. He has also officiated as magistrate for eight years. Both he and his wife are exemplary members of the Baptist Church

of Newberg, and all benevolent and religious enterprises find in them generous supporters. They have been blessed with two children—Harvey (deceased) and Franklin.

#### JAMES M. DYER.

James M. Dyer was born in the town of Oswegatchie, St. Lawrence Co., N. Y., July 27, 1834. His father, who was a native of Vermont, was a soldier in the war of 1812, and participated in many of the battles. In this engagement, Gen. Scott was wounded and he assisted in carrying him off the field. His mother was born in Canada, and was the mother of seven children—Urias, Elizabeth E., Josiah, Cornelius, James M., Caroline and Jane. At the age of fifteen, Mr. Dyer commenced life as a farm hand, which calling he followed for seven years. At the age of twenty-two he was married to Miss Phebe O. Houghtaling, of Newberg. The Dyer family are one of the old pioneer families of St. Joseph County, having emigrated there in 1834, settling in Constatine, where they remained until the spring of 1843, when they came to Cass County and settled on the farm where he now resides. They have two children—Ella A., now Mrs. Edgar Wetherbee, and Arthur G. Mr. Dyer has been the architect of his own fortune; commencing life without educational advantages and with nothing but strong hands and a firm desire to succeed, he has acquired a competency and built up an honorable reputation.
