ervices Held Monday For Aged Pioneer

FRIDAY

Mrs, Hariette Carlton Came to Iowa in 1856

Funeral services were held Monday at 2:00 o'clock at the home and at 2:30 at the Presbyterian church for Mrs. Hariette Carlton, 91, who died Friday afternoon after a long illness. Coming to Iowa with her parents in 1566 she spent her childhood in a 16g cubin near the present site of Story

Rev. W. F. Schneck was in charge of the services. Music was furnished by quartet composed of Mrs. R. B. Mather, Mrs. C. J. Morrison, Mrs. G. DeBoer, and Mrs. W. F. Fisher. They sang the hymns: "Beautiful Island Somewhere," "Rock of Ages," and The Old Rugged Cross."

The flowers were in charge of Mrs. L. R. Davidson, Mrs. H. C. Jones, and J. C. Olerich. The pallbearers were grandsons of the deceased: Frank, Raymond, Clyde and Don Behrendsen, Willard Peterson and Donald Carlton.

Among those from out of town attending the services were Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Doolittle and Charles Greiner of Webster City; William Doolittle, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Doolittle, Mrs. Mary Doolittle, of Story City; Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Doolittle and daughter of Woodstock; Mr. and Mrs. Ira Brown of Gilbert; Mr. and Mrs. Fred Doolittle of Blairsburg; Mr. and Mrs. City ford Claude of Woolstock.

Hariette Lilian Doolittle, oldest daughter of William R. and Fidelia E. Doolittle was born in Bellair, Crawford county, Illinois, January 12, 1853. When some three years old she came of the parents to the immediate vicinity of the present day Story City, Iowa, where they selected and settled on a homestead under the Homestead Act and where they built and immediately moved into one of the first white man's log cabins built along the upper reaches of the Skunk River in 1856.

Here she spent her childhood days and received such schooling as was available in those early pioneer days of lowa and where she received such religious training as was freely given by these early settlers who would gather together in small groups from home to home and where the newcomer was always welcome and where folks lived in peace and fellowship even also with the Indians who paid them frequent visits from the Indian Reservation of Tama.

On November 7, 1872, she was Inited in marriage to Thomas E. Carlfon. They continued to live near Story City, also later near Ames, Iowa, and in 1885 moved to Ruthven. In the spring of 1886 they bought and com menced the building of a home on a small farm one mile east of the town of Rolfe where they continued to live until their children were nearly grown when her husband, Thomas E. Carlton, took sick with a cancer of the liver and died on July 6, 1916, after a short illness leaving his widow, Harictte Lilian Carlton, and the five children born to them, namely Mrs. Ida E. Behrendsen, near Gilmore City, Mrs. Ella Peterson of Pocahontas, Mrs. Alma Sandy, Frank Carlton and Tony Carlton of Rolfe.

Since the death of her husband, Mrs. Carlton has lived in and around the town of Rolfe, her last home being within the town limits. She comes of sturdy pioneer stock. She has lived up to those pioneer traditions, she has given assistance where it was needed, be it man or animals. She was an admirer of all outdoor life of God's creation and no one ever went away from her home hungry. She united with the Presbyterian church March 24, 1892. She has been outstanding in devotion to husband and her family, a kind and loving mother to her children and they bespeak their love and praise for her. Many are they who call her grandma. She has assisted in church and social functions as long as her health and strength would permit.

She now leaves in addition to the five children above mentioned, two brothers, R. L. Doolittle of Webster City and William J. Doolittle of Story City, also a sister, Miss Emma W. Doolittle of Story City, 14 grandchildren, 32 great grandchildren and two freat great grandchildren. Her life span was 91 years, two months and 26 days. The last year of which she was confined to her bed and in the constant care of her faithful nurse. She has now found at last, a haven of rest.
