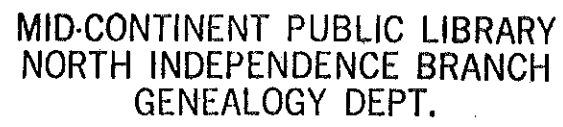

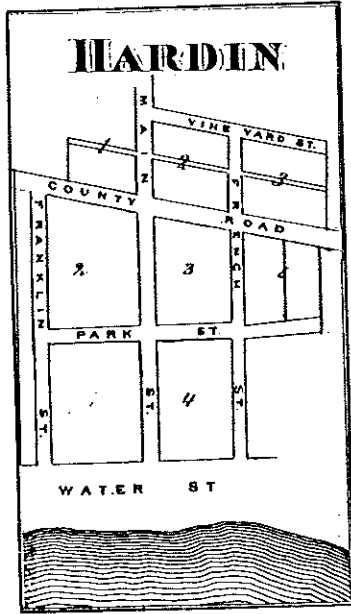
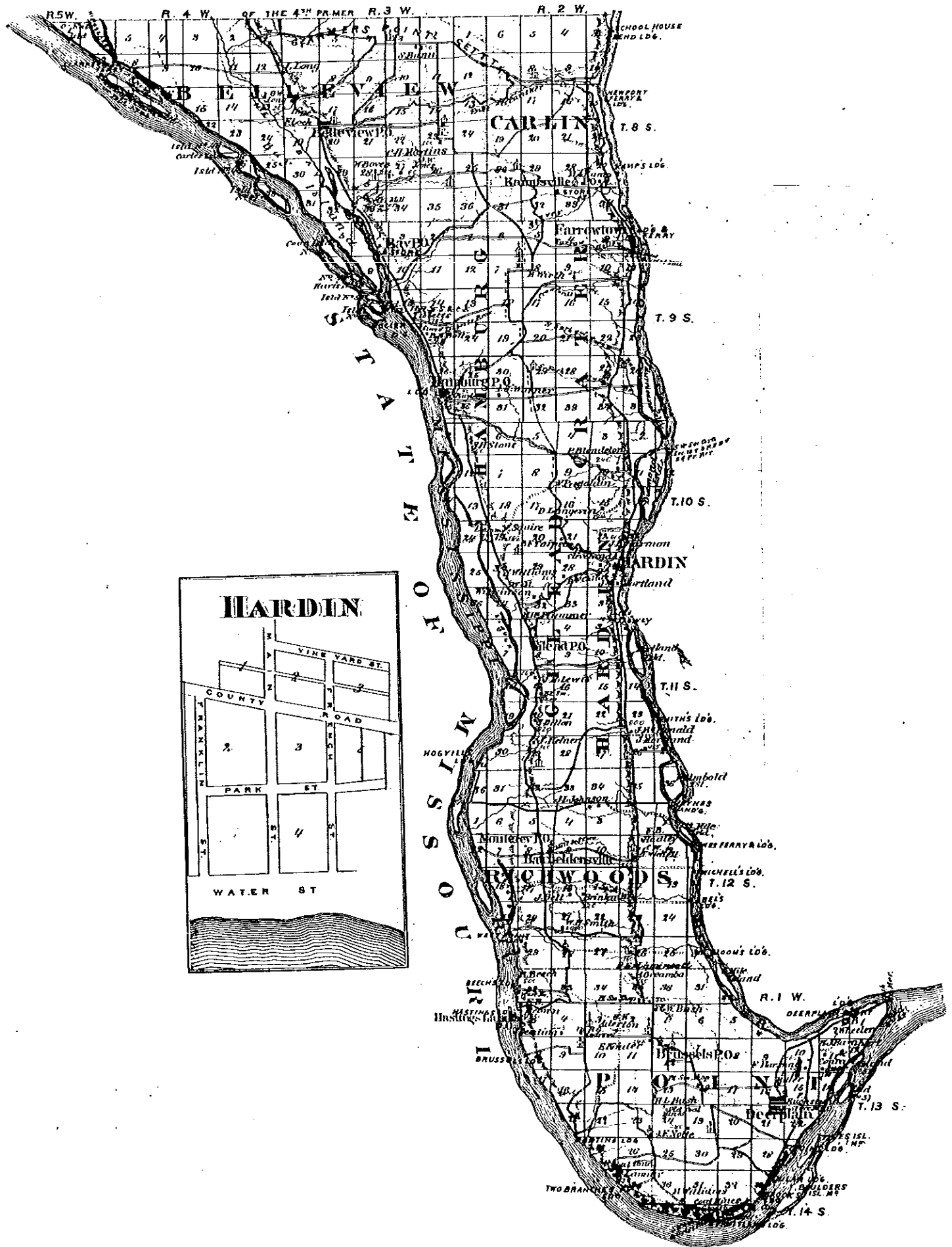

Jonas Lutellas Ward, Jr. married Mary (Molly) Plummer. They had 10 children; Margaret (Maggie) Ward, Art Ward, Sarah Ward, Fay Ward, Maude Ward, William (Will) Ward, Anna Ward, Addie Ward, Ruth Ward and Lessie Ward.

Jonas was a lawyer and a very good one. He had a beautiful house on a farm with lots of the most beautiful flowers. Folks came from all around to see his display. He also raised horses.

When he was in his mid 50's his best friend fell in a well and Jonas jumped in to save him, after a long struggle, he got him to the top and found out he was already dead. As he was getting out of the well he fell back and struck his head and he too was dead when they pulled him out. He died on May 16th, 1896.

Jonas was a great hunter, in fact, he was so good that the other members of the Woodman's Lodge, of which he was a member, seldom ask him to go hunting with them because he always killed most of the game. After his death, the Woodman's Lodge gave his wife a team of mares (each soon to have a colt), a milk cow and \$25.00.

Jonas's dad was a doctor and his brother, Jeff. was a District Attorney in Hardin, Illinois. He had a half brother, Selby, who was a hero in World War I.

Dr. Jonas Ward and Dr. Park lived at Fieldon during or right after the Civil War. They rode horseback to do their doctoring. Sometimes the bushwackers would try to catch them so they traveled together and were always armed. It is possible they may have been brothers-in-law because the Parks were some relation.

No further information is available because the courthouse burned in 1875 destroying all records of Licking County, Ohio.

SHOCKING ACCIDENT.

Two of Calhoun County's Best Citizens
Meet Death by Asphyxiation.

J. L. Ward Loses His Life in At-
tempting to Save That of F.
W. Sudbrack.

About midnight, Saturday, the 16th inst., news reached Hardin that F. W. Sudbrack and J. L. Ward had been drowned in a well at the farm house of the former, one mile south of Belleview. The news cast a shadow of sadness over this community where both of the deceased are well known and universally respected. It was later learned that death had been caused by asphyxiation, instead of drowning. The particulars are as follows:

Last Saturday afternoon Mrs. Sudbrack requested her husband, Fred Sudbrack, to get the horse and buggy out, as she wanted to take a little drive. Fred started to do as requested, when in passing the well he noticed the bucket had, somehow, fallen into the well and, it appears, Mr. Sudbrack descended into the well on a rope for the purpose of getting the bucket, where Mrs. Sudbrack found him a short time after, perfectly helpless, and no doubt dead. She started for help immediately, and met J. L. Ward and a Mr. Grace, whom she told of her trouble. Mr. Ward ran to the well at once and left Grace to attend to the team. As soon as Mr. Ward reached the well he lowered himself to the bottom, it being but fourteen feet, with the intention no doubt of tying the rope around Sudbrack's body and have it raised to the surface. In an incredibly short time after striking the water's edge he certainly felt the necessity of getting out as

quickly as possible, for he began to hollow for Grace to come to his assistance. Mr. Grace got there as soon as possible and pulled Mr. Ward within four feet of the surface when his - Ward's - hold gave way and he fell back a corpse. Both deaths were caused by "damps" in the well. From the time Mr. Ward got in the well until his body fell back lifeless, was not to exceed two minutes. Neighbors soon collected at the "death trap" and drew the two lifeless forms from its embrace. Physicians attempted to resuscitate the bodies but all to no purpose. They were interred Sunday afternoon amid a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends.

J. L. Ward was a member of Calhoun Lodge 444, I. O. O. F., and was buried by that organization. He was about forty years of age and leaves a wife and eight children to grieve over the loss of a kind husband and loving father.

F. W. Sudbrack leaves a wife and one child who can never forget the good and noble qualities of a husband and father.

Besides the immediate family of each, there are many relatives and hundreds of friends who are sad over the untimely death of these two well beloved neighbors and citizens. We extend to the bereaved wives and fatherless children our heartfelt sympathy in their great affliction.
