VISITING WIDOW PENDERGRAFT IN POND CREEK, OKLAHOMA
17th October 1990

Mrs. Pendergraft told of her husband, Claude L. Pendergraft, who worked at building roads. He had the job of supervising the work, he also made blue-prints they used. In stepping down off a Caterpillar tractor he injured a toe. He refused to get medical attention and it became infected. He had gotten Buerger's disease and amputations started with the removal of the nail of the infected toe, on the right foot she believes.

Eventually his leg was taken off at the knee. He continued on his job with the roads by getting about upon a wooden leg he had made for himself. Before the disease was arrested it had spread until his other leg was removed and also the fingers of one hand.

Now unable to hold down his job he went to selling liquor. Refusing to be stopped he took care of himself by sliding his rear end over the floor. He had Mrs. Pendergraft help in selling the liquor, and of which she was very fearful of and did not want to do it. But they had a large family with no way to provide for them.

One time a stranger came to the door to buy liquor and she was busy getting ready to scald a chicken, intending to get what the man wanted as soon as she finished scalding the chicken. Not waiting for her, he came and took hold of her. Instead of pouring the hot water on the chicken she turned and poured it down his shoe. He left without getting what he came for and she never saw him again.

The family eventually got on welfare and she stopped selling liquor.

ADDENDUM:

Betty Ward works at Suds Your Duds, 3 to 10 PM, 7 days a week, in Enid, Oklahoma. She drives back and forth between Enid and Pond Creek, Oklahoma, where she lives. She also takes care of an elderly lady at 8 to 11 AM each day.

On October 17th, 1990, at about 11:30 AM we followed Betty down to Enid. She took us by to meet her son, Rodney Ward, at his place of work. Rodney has worked 15 years for the Gold Spot Dairy - Associated Milk Producers, Inc. in Enid.

She then took us to visit her son, Willy Ward, at his home at 602 West Walnut, Enid, OK 73701. Willy has worked 3 years, & 4 months for the General Supply Company, a company that makes a drilling additive (for oil) of Wyoming soil. He works as Warehouse Manager. There we visited with Willy until about 1:00 PM when we followed Betty across town to a bowling alley where she generally bowls.

There we met her sister, Jo Ann and her daughter. We bought and ate our lunch at the alley while Betty, JoAnn and her daughter bowled several games.

After they had finished their games we followed Betty to the Suds Your Duds where she works. While still visiting with her her daughter Linda and husband, Tim Campbell came by and visited. Tim is a house painter working on individual contracts.

We left Betty on the job at Suds Your Duds and returned to Pond Creek where we spent the evening visiting with Betty's mother, Mrs. Hazel Pendergraft, and later with Betty when she got home around midnight.

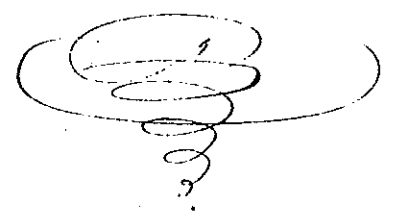

Rowan Husband Admits Murder

A three-year-old girl and her two-year-old brother, naked and dirty, suffering from malnutrition, and unable to talk, or even cry, were found late yesterday standing vigil over the badly decomposed body of their 33-year-old mother whom their 52-year-old father is charged with murdering.

The children were in their cribs in the five-room frame house, situated in a clump of woods about three-fourths mile off the Reeves Island Road, 20 miles north-east of Salisbury.

And their mother, Mrs. Alice Faye Rowland Smith, was lying on a couch in the same room with a 2 1/2 pump rifle between her legs.

At 11:30 p.m. on Monday, the woman had been dead since Monday, July 1, when she was found late yesterday by Corporal Rufus Honeycutt and Deputy Sheriff Henry A. Hoffman.

The father, Roy Lee Smith, a peddler of produce and shrubbery, called ambulance attendants to the home and in doing so set off a chain of events which led to his being charged with murder at 9 o'clock today.

It was about 3:30 o'clock yesterday when Deputy Hoffman was notified of the conditions at the home by an attendant of the Hartwell Funeral Home in Albemarle. He and Corporal Honeycutt arrived at the home, in Morgan Township near the Stany County line, and the conditions which they found were described as "unbelievable."

They said the two children, Brenda, 3, and Jimmy Lee, 2, apparently had not eaten during the week they had been in the living room with their mother.

Corporal Honeycutt said they were lean and gaunt, dirty, naked and were in such a state of apparent shock they could not talk, nor even cry.

When they first questioned Mr. Smith, he admitted he had married and the father of six other children, he gave a version of what had taken place during the past week.

But his story, according to the two investigators, did not fit into a pattern.

Mr. Smith told the two officials he left home, about 2 p.m., on Monday, July 1, to begin a round of selling produce and shrubbery. He said he never left his wife in good spirits and was playing with the children, Mr. Smith, according to Mr. Honeycutt and Deputy Hoffman, gave his wife a 110 bill and two \$20 bills for use while he was away.

In addition, he said he left the pickup truck in the yard for her to use on errands. He set off on foot.

He related to the officers that he spent Monday and Tuesday nights with his father in Stany County; that on Wednesday he was in Union County and spent that night at the home of his father; that on Thursday he was in Locust and spent the night at the home of his brother-in-law; that on Friday he was in Locust and Stanfield and returned to the home of his father that night.

Saturday, the defendant related, he was selling trees in Galboro and Union County and that he spent Saturday night and part of Sunday at the home of his father.

Later in the day, he said he went to Millington to the home of a brother and that night he was again at the residence of his father, Mrs. Smith.

Mr. Smith related to Mr. Honeycutt and Deputy Hoffman that yesterday he went back home and found his wife lying on the couch

and the children in their cribs. The Rowan deputy said Mr. Smith informed him he walked and hitch-hiked to Albemarle to the mortuary.

When attendants of the funeral home arrived at the Smith residence, and found the existing conditions, they contacted the sheriff's department here.

ON COUCH

After Mr. Honeycutt and Mr. Hoffman saw Mrs. Smith lying on the couch, with the 2 1/2 pump rifle between her legs, and her right hand on the gun stock and her left across her breast, they ordered the body removed.

They brought the weapon back to the sheriff's office and upon examination they noticed the rifle had been pumped again and a bullet was in the firing chamber.

Their suspicions were aroused when they were at the home because they found a spent cartridge.

Anti-Red Speaker Law Repeal Asked

RALEIGH (AP) — The battle lines are beginning to shape up as the skirmishing continues over North Carolina's newly enacted law banning Communist speakers at state-supported colleges.

The executive committee of the Consolidated University Board of Trustees unanimously adopted a resolution Monday urging the full board to take steps to have the law repealed.

The committee's action came only a day after the North Carolina Department of the American Legion put itself on record as favoring the measure.

The bill was passed in the waning days of the 1953 General Assembly. The hurried fashion in which it was passed brought bitter opposition from many lawmakers.

The controversy surrounding the bill gave rise to speculation that a movement aimed at repealing it might be launched in a special session of the Legislature which Gov. Sanford plans to call later in the year.

The law specifically bans persons who are known to have advocated overthrow of the U.S. or state constitutions or persons who have pleaded the Fifth Amendment in loyalty trials or hearings.

The committee's resolution said the law is "entirely to academic freedom and contrary to the traditions of the consolidated university, and other state educational institutions."

It asked the full board to "take appropriate steps to endeavor to eliminate this restriction upon academic freedom."

But the announcement of opposition to the measure was coupled with assurance that it will be headed at all three units of the consolidated university.

New Concepts In Newspapers Are Outlined

ASHEVILLE, N.C. (AP) — Newspaper executives predicted increases in both newspaper readers and advertising volume here Monday.

Roger C. Peace, publisher of the Greenville (S.C.) News and Piedmont told a luncheon meeting of the National Newspaper Advertising Executive Association that "emphasis throughout the country is on education, and education means reading."

"National advertising will come back to us in increased volume," Peace predicted.

Association President Melvin E. Tharp of the Columbia (Mo.) Dispatch and Citizen Journal said executives will change most of the present concepts in producing and delivering newspapers.

He said newspapers may soon be printed in the subscriber's living room "on a magazine that may even sell for less than the average television set."

Peace traced the evolution of advertising and noted the influence of radio and television as competitors for newspapers.

Peace said the full impact of the evolution came with television which "changed the habits of a people, the ways of doing business for millions, the structure of many industries, and even the way of electing a president."

338 Negroes In Cabarrus Ask For 'Our Own School'

CONCORD — Construction of a separate, Negro high school has been requested by a delegation of Negro parents during yesterday's meeting of the Cabarrus Board of School Board Chairman H. E. Cline said that if a separate high school was built for county Negro students, neither the city nor county would have sufficient students for a standard high school. He did assure parents that

CORE Delays Race March In Maryland

Baltimore (AP) — Leaders of the segregation movement in Maryland called off today a demonstration planned for late afternoon at Myrtle Oak amusements.

Segregationists and leaders of the Citizens of Racial Equality decided to postpone the march on the privately owned, segregated park "as an act of good faith."

They announced the postponement at a meeting Monday night in the Baltimore County Council had voted unanimously Monday night to establish a human relations council.

W. T. Agnew, Baltimore County executive, was notified of the postponement. Meeting with the CORE leaders were members of the interdenominational Christian intergroup.

Presbyterian minister had scheduled to lead the march on the amusement park in Baltimore's northwestern outer ring, where some 350 persons were arrested in two previous massive demonstrations.

In Cambridge, about 85 miles southeast and across Chesapeake Bay, Negro leaders sought to rally support for another march to protest segregation signs at public accommodations.

About 125 Negroes and whites participated in such a demonstration there Monday night after the nighttime withdrawal of National Guard units which had kept peace in the racially tense community since last night.

While the gunfire and store-burglaries which marked similar marches in Cambridge before the arrival of guardmen, there was no violence Monday night.

An afternoon sit-in attempt by demonstrators was broken up by a restaurant proprietor who pushed members of the group out of his place and locked the door.

When the demonstrators—250 Negroes and three whites—knock in front of the restaurant and sang integration songs, the proprietor, Robert Fehsenfeld, cuffed a young white man in the group on the right side of the face.

He then broke a raw egg on the man's head, smeared it about his face, and threw a milk can full of water over him.

 ridge from a 22 rifle in the back yard and noise in the living room. However, they said nothing of the find and returned to Salisbury to begin an intensive investigation which lasted during the night and until 9 o'clock today when Mr. Smith confessed. Sheriff Arthur Shuping, Deputies Hoffman, R. J. Shaw and C. L. Wilhelm last night took Mr. Smith into custody for further questioning.

CONFESSION

About 9 o'clock today, Mr. Smith gave the following statement to Sheriff Shuping and Deputy Hoffman and made in the presence of Deputies Shaw and Wilhelm: "I, Roy Lee Smith, make the following statement without promise of any favor or threat: "Monday night, July 1, 1963 when I tried to have intercourse with my wife for the third time and could not, my wife said I had been drinking too much and she said that she was going to kill me when I went to sleep. Both of us had been drinking that day. We both went into the living room about the same time; we were still arguing and she reached for the gun that was hanging on the wall above the stove in the living room. We got in a scuffle for the gun and I took it away from her. I put it back up on the rack. She reached for it again and we got into a scuffle over it and had the gun down between us. Both of our hands were down around the trigger and I would rather think her fingers were on the trigger cause they were smaller than mine. The gun went off and she fell on the couch. I walked out on the back porch and threw the empty cartridge out of the gun and then walked back into the living room. That is when I placed her feet up on the couch and put the gun between her legs. I left and took some beer from the house and went down into the woods. I stayed in the woods for the most of the week. I went back to the house every day and gave the children milk and water. After a week it got so hot and the children had to have something done for them. I went to Altmarle to Hartzell Funeral Home and told them to come pick up my wife, that she was dead. "We were both about drunk Monday night and during the day. She had threatened to shoot me three times before." Deputy Hoffman said Mr. Smith also had an explanation for the spent cartridge found in the yard.

LOST NERVE

He said Mr. Smith told him he reloaded the gun and planned to shoot himself—but lost his nerve. Despite the alleged confession, investigating officers said there were other clues which did not match. Coroner Hooeyrutt expressed doubt that the two children had received any nourishment whatever during the week. He added they appeared to be too malnourished. He said the ice box was filled with food, such as hocco, eggs, milk, cabbage and other edibles. He said the house was filthy and unkempt, that chickens, and possibly other animals, had been in and out of the house during the seven days. And he added, the theory that a produce salesman would leave so foot to sell his merchandise did not tie into the normal manner of thinking. Sheriff Shuping also discounted the belief that Mr. Smith had returned to his home since July 1. He said he had learned Mrs. Smith had been previously married as had Mr. Smith, the father of six children by his first wife.

Cops Jackknife, Causing \$1,300 Damage On 29

CHINA GROVE—A car towing another car ran off Highway 29 last night and a pickup truck colliding with one, or both, of the cars. In Murder Case Smith To Be Tried In Sept.; No Bond

Probable cause against Roy Lee Smith, 52-year-old salesman of produce and shrubbery, for murder was found today by Judge Ira Swicegood after a preliminary hearing in County Court.

The defendant, charged with the July 1 slaying of his 38-year-old wife, Mrs. Alice Faye Rowland Smith, was ordered held without bond pending trial in Superior Court in September.

An attorney representing Smith sought to have a bond fixed on the basis that no premeditation was shown in the act but his plea was rejected by Judge Swicegood.

Deputy Sheriff Henry A. Hoffman and Coroner Rufus Honeycutt offered the only testimony for the state in the preliminary hearing.

Mr. Honeycutt said the deceased was found on July 8 lying on a couch in the living room of their frame home, just off the Reeves Island Road, about 20 miles northeast of Salisbury.

He said Mrs. Smith had apparently been dead for about eight days, that cause of death was a bullet wound which had penetrated just below her chin, and the slug had ranged backwards.

Mr. Honeycutt said when he and Mr. Hoffman arrived at the home they found the two children of Mr. and Mrs. Smith. He said Brenda, 3, and Jimmy Lee, 2, both appeared to be suffering from malnutrition and he order-

ed both sent to the Stanly County Hospital in Albemarle for medical care.

Deputy Hoffman said he and Coroner Honeycutt went to the home about 4:30 o'clock on the afternoon of July 8 and found Mr. Smith standing in the yard.

He related Mr. Smith informed him that Mrs. Smith had taken her own life but he could offer no explanation for the act.

Mr. Hoffman said he and Mr. Honeycutt then returned to Salisbury, examined the .22 pump rifle, which had been found between Mrs. Smith's legs, and noted it had been re-pumped and another bullet had entered the firing chamber.

He related that later in the night Mr. Smith was brought to Salisbury for questioning and during that period he told of his whereabouts during the week.

However, Mr. Hoffman said on the following morning Mr. Smith signed a statement in which he said he and his wife had been drinking, that she had threatened to kill him and had taken the .22 rifle from a rack in the house.

The Rowan deputy said the statement pointed out Mr. Smith thought Mrs. Smith might have pulled the trigger. The defendant admitted in the statement, however, that after the shot was fired he placed his wife on the couch and the gun between her legs.

Mr. Smith's statement said he returned to the house on several occasions during the week to give his children milk and water.

No evidence was offered by the defendant during the hearing.

Smith Trial

The trial of Roy Lee Smith, 52, charged with the murder of his wife, is slated to begin in Superior Court here today at 2 o'clock before Judge Frank M. Armstrong.

Solicitor Zeb Morris said the trial would start at that time.

Smith was indicted for the murder of his wife, Mrs. Alice Faye Rowland Smith, 32, last July at their home just off the Reeves Island Road, near the Stanly County line.

The Rowan County Grand Jury late yesterday returned a true bill of murder against Smith, who is at liberty under a \$20,000 bond.

Smith Begins 14-25 Years For Slaying Of His Wife

A 53-year-old Rowan County Smith, through his attorney, Dick Brown of Albemarle, entered a nolo contendere plea to the murder of his wife, Mrs. Alice Faye Rowland Smith, last July 2 in their frame home just off the Reeves Island Road, in the eastern area of Rowan County.

and the barrel pointed toward her chin, was found on a sofa in their home on July 2 upon information furnished by Smith.

The sentence was imposed yesterday by Judge Frank M. Armstrong, now presiding in Superior Court here, upon Roy Lee Smith.

Their two children, badly emaciated and in an apparent state of shock, had been in a crib in the living room with their dead mother for about five days.

Her badly decomposed body, with a .22 rifle between her legs

In his remarks to Judge Armstrong, Attorney Brown said his client's "trouble has been drinking." He said he had known Smith for about 20 years and pointed out the defendant "has several drunken convictions."

Brown also told Judge Armstrong the nolo contendere plea was entered with approval of the defendant.

"At some later date," Brown said in his plea in behalf of the defendant, "we may get evidence someone else committed the murder. We have some reason to believe it might be possible. If the occasion arises the defendant will be in a position of having entered the plea of nolo contendere instead of guilty."

To further substantiate his contention that Smith had a drinking problem, Brown pointed out Smith came to Salisbury early Tuesday morning for trial, left and was later picked up in an intoxicated condition on US Highway 52 between Granite Quarry and Rockwell.

An array of witnesses were called in behalf of the defendant to testify of the apparent admission.

able relations between Smith and his wife.

Carl Rowland, who lives in Stanly County, said he lived in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Smith for over four years "and they got along as good as any two people in the world," he said.

He told the court Mrs. Smith was his niece and that both Smith and his wife "drank sometimes."

Henry Lower, also of Stanly County and a former neighbor of Smith, said he knew of no trouble between the couple. He said Mrs. Smith often accompanied her husband on his tours to sell produce and shrubbery.

Mrs. D. B. Wells of Richfield said she had known the couple for about one year. She added she worked in a grocery store and on occasions she had kept the small daughter of the Smiths which he sold her.

Smith had been free under an \$18,000 bond granted by Judge Iral H. Walker of Asheboro after a habeas corpus hearing several days after the preliminary hearing before Judge Tra Braxton in Stanly County.

Attorney Brown told Judge Armstrong that the 32-month-old daughter of the Smiths was at the home of Smith's parents and the 18-month-old son had been placed in a foster home by the Rowan County Welfare Department.

A Rowan County Grand Jury, at the September term of Superior Court, had returned a bill against Smith charging him with murder in the first degree.

hospital where Dr. Claude Ballinger Jr. examined them. The girl was suffering from a loss of weight, and body fluid. She was not responsive and could not cry or speak, the coroner said.

The boy, he said was markedly emaciated, and was in an apparent coma. He was barely responsive and his eyes were set in a fixed condition. The girl, who was in the better condition, was turned over to the maternal grandmother and the boy was kept in the hospital.

Henry Hoffman said Smith said that he couldn't understand why his wife had killed herself. Smith continued that he left the home July 1 about 2 o'clock and that when he left she was laughing and playing with the children. He said he left the truck for her to go to the store.

Hoffman added that Smith appeared "red-eyed" which he interpreted as grief.

Hoffman read the statement which Roy Smith wrote and signed on the morning of July 9 in which he said that he and his wife had had an argument and struggled over the gun that had fallen over on the couch. The statement said that he had taken the gun into the back yard and pumped out the cartridge after which he returned to the house and placed his wife's feet on the couch and the gun between her knees.

Hoffman said that he took the gun back into Salisbury and in the presence of three witnesses

saw that there was a live cartridge in the chamber.

The defense attorney asked Mr. Hoffman if he had talked with Smith since July 8. Mr. Hoffman said he had.

The attorney asked Hoffman if he had any opinion that he needed psychiatric treatment as the result of his conversation. "Very definitely," Mr. Hoffman said he replied.

Sheriff Arthur Shuping said that he and Deputies R. J. Shaw and C. L. Wilhelm questioned Smith shortly after he was picked up. The sheriff said Smith agreed to go to his home and show him just what happened. As they started, the sheriff said, Smith made the statement that there was no need to go. He, Smith, would tell him about it.

Smith told the sheriff that on July 3 he went to the store and bought some beer. Through his investigation, the sheriff found that Smith had stayed in the woods and in the barn near his home and that both places he found numerous empty beer cans.

Sheriff Shuping asked Smith if the reason he hung around home was the hope that someone would come in and find his wife. He said Smith replied that he did get back to the house twice.
