NELLIE JANE RIGGS, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mabel Muir, in Raytown. Died December 26, 1939, 77 years, five months, four days.

She was the daughter of Benjamin Lacey and Jane Cox, and was born in the Rice homestead just north and west of Raytown, July 22, 1862. As a child she spent a few years in Texas and then came back to this community, where she lived until her marriage to William Riggs, February 25, 1885. They moved to Tennessee until 1910 when the family went to Pleasant hill. She lived in Pleasant Hill until 1930 when she moved to Raytown to make her home with her daughter, Mrs. Mabel Muir, and spent the rest of her life there. Mr. Riggs died eleven years ago.

At age eighteen she joined the West Fork Baptist church and kept her membership in that church which is now Raytown Baptist church.

She was the mother of ten children, five preceded her in death. She is survived by three daughters; Mrs. Mabel Muir of Raytown, Mrs. Iva Reimer of Olathe, Kansas, Mrs. Marie Mehrer of Pleasant Hill; two sons, Edgar Riggs of Pleasant Hill and Ben Riggs of Raytown; fifteen grandchildren, one great granddaughter; two brothers, Henry and Arch Rice of Raytown.

Funeral services were held at the Raytown Baptist Church December 28, 1939.

SAMUEL A. HUNTER, was born December 11, 1860, on a fam near Raytown, and lived the greater part of his life in this community. After a few short trips to neighboring states and a longer stay in California he bought a farm one and half miles east of Raytown and continued to operate this farm until 1915. He left for a trip through the west, and spent a winter in New Mexico. After returning he went to live with his sister, Mrs. Laura B. Smith, until her death in 1929 He then returned to his farm, which he operated until the condition of his health compelled him to make a change. From this time on he made his home with his brothers and sisters on the old home place, until his death.

Energy and determination were the outstanding marks of his mature life until the end of a long and successful life.

The end came at age of 79 years and two days on December 29, 1939, two days after the death of his older sister, Miss Ann Eliza Hunter.

The construction of a new administration building for the National Air College, which is to be established at the local flying field, is to start February 15. The field has been operated in recent years by the Kansas City Flying Service, and was known as Richards Field. It was from this field that the first air mail to be flown in and out of Kansas City was established.

The school which has a government contract for training students from Rockhurst College, Military Academy and Emporia State Teachers College, was to move to the local field from Kansas City Municipal Air Terminal this week.

It was estimated nearly 100 students in training when the school is established and weather conditions permit work to be done. The building will cost approximately \$12,000, will contain a spacious lounge, restaurant and locker rooms for visiting private pilots.

# J.J. HERMAN DIED TUESDAY -FUNERAL FRIDAY IN INDEPENDENCE

J. J. Herman, died at his home on Raytown Road Tuesday evening following a brief illness. He had been a patient in Research hospital about two weeks and was brought home Monday. He suffered a cerebral embolus as he was being brought home Monday afternoon in a motor car, and while he was conscious he was unable to talk.

Always an active man in anything in which he was interested himself. Herman was known as the alfalfa king for many years, and advertised alfalfa for sale cured the Herman way. He farmed in the Cracker Neck district, from 1905 when he came to this county until 1927 and was said to have been the first farmer in this section to raise alfalfa commercially.

He quit farming in 1927 and moved to this community where he started his well known U-Smile tourist camp which was among the first such enterprises in this section of the county. From the original camp he spread to a total of five filling stations and three tourist camps. They were located in eastern Jackson County on US 50; old US 40 & Raytown road; US 40 & Little Blue River; US 40 Cut-off; and US 24.

Mr. Herman was born January 16, 1879, in Mallard, Iowa and died on his 60<sup>th</sup> birthday. When he was a boy he homesteaded in Western Nebraska, in what is known as the Old Jules country, coming to Jackson County in 1905.

He was a well known face in the Raytown community and there was never a question where he stood on any proposition in which he took interest. He was either for it or very much against it, and he never hesitated to express his opinion forcefully.

An unusual circumstance concerning his business relations and experience is that his business is manned by his own family, and all six of his sons are actively in the management of his business. He had not been active at his camps or filling stations for several years having turned it to his sons sometime ago.

He is survived by his wife, Mary A. Herman of the home on Raytown road just east of its junction with Old US 40 Highway and where his No 1 tourist camp is located. There are two daughters; Mrs. Celia Lober of Independence and Mrs. Mabel Rieder 406 Blue Ridge; six sons, Joseph G Herman, Andrew J. Herman, Lawrence A. Herman, Clarence J. Herman, all of this neighborhood; Roy D. Herman of Oak Grove and Carl Herman of Kansas City; eighteen grandchildren also survive.

He is survived by three sisters; Mrs. Lizzie Waggoner of Graettinger, Iowa; Mrs. Mary Wels

of Afton, Iowa; Mrs. Rosa Eldred of Alliance, Nebraska; one brother, Jacob J. Herman of Lakeside, Nebraska.

Mr. and Mrs. Herman were married April 1896 at Loup, Nebraska.

Mr. Herman was the son of German emigrants who came to this country several years before he was born. Two brothers of the family are dead.

Funeral services were at the Carson Funeral Home in Independence. Burial in Brooking Cemetery. (Brooking Cemetery: Joseph J. Herman 1870-1940; Mary A. Herman 1880-1958 Obit states she was born in Poland and came to US, an infant—brother Andrew Barent of Rockville, NE)
