She was born in Wabash, Indiana, the daughter of Arthur and Mary Brubaker. When sixteen years old she moved to Olathe, Kansas, living there about five years. From there she came to Kansas City, Mo., to the home at Harrison Farm 35 years ago. Dr. and Mrs. Harrison operated the only drug store in Raytown from 1916-1917, then as her chicken dinner started as a side line, increased, they sold the drug business, to devote all their time to the chicken dinner business.
