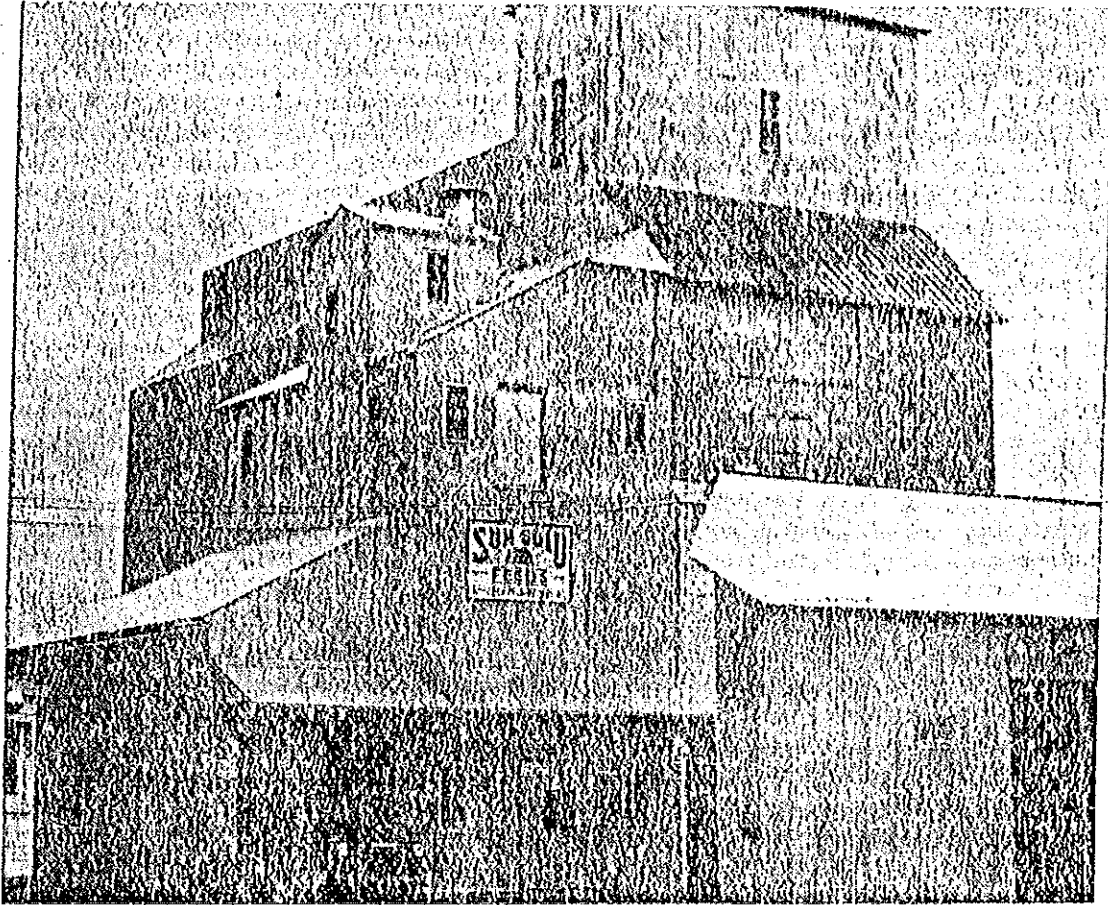

First Alfalfa Grown in 90's
 The first alfalfa grown in this county was planted by John Gishwiller who bought 85 pounds of seed while on a trip to Ogden, Utah, in the 1800's. He seeded a five-acre tract on his farm southwest of Almena and before 1895 he had sold over \$5,000 worth of seed. In 1920 there were 3,784 acres of alfalfa reported in Norton County, in 1944 the acreage was 4,422 and in 1954 14,759 acres were grown. Of this, a reported 863 acres were grown for seed.

Almema 2 1969

Almena, a city of approximately six hundred inhabitants, is located in the agriculturally rich Prairie Dog Creek Valley. The city was first established in 1877 on the south bank of the Prairie Dog Creek and at that time consisted of a mill, a blacksmith shop, a boarding house and two stores.

The Lincoln Land Company platted the land north of the Prairie Dog in 1885 and gave choice lots to merchants as an inducement for them to move their stores to the new location. The Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad had recently been built and passed through the new townsite. Residential lots were also given by the land company for the hopes of construction of new homes. The Rock Island Line reached Almema two years later. This was the beginning of the real growth of Almema.

The first U. S. Postoffice under the name of Almema was established in 1872 further down the Prairie Dog. Five years later it was moved to the present townsite. However, the postoffice has been moved several times to different buildings through the years.

The first bank was organized in 1898 as the Merchants State Bank. The Almema State Bank was started in 1906. The Merchants Bank and the Almema State Bank merged in 1929. At the present time the First State Bank of Almema is the only bank in the city.

Since the beginning of its existence Almema has always been making progress. The city was incorporated by the board of county commissioners in 1893. The petition for the city's incorporation was signed by fifty-four residents.
