T. D. Yantiss Died At His Home Here

Talmage DeWitt Yantiss, 92, passed away at his home in Alma late Wednesday, October 31. He had been in failing health for the past several years.

Born September 25, 1878 at Verdon, Nebr., he moved with his family to Long Island, Kans., in 1901. Here he grew to manhood and was united in marriage to Christal Fay Halderman on May 1, 1909.

For many years Mr. Yantiss and his family resided on a farm in the Long Island community and following his retirement he and Mrs. Yantiss moved to Alma in March, 1964.

For a short time Mr. Yantiss also owned the newspaper, "The New Leaf" at Long Island.
