January 13, 1944 Raytown News

Johnny Walker, director of Civilian Defense, states the Brooking Township Fire District, will have a new fire truck. The apparatus is built around high pressure centrifugal pump, which is motor operated. The equipment carries adjustable hydrant wrenches, 24 foot extension ladder, 14 foot ladder, hose and ladder straps. Long handled square mouth shovel, 6 pound pick head axe, claw tools, 8 foot pipe pole.... The next thing needed is a truck bed to place this upon....

WALLACE JENNINGS KILLED IN ACTION Wallace Jennings of Santa Anna, California, and recently was promoted from First Lieutenant to Captain, serving as a pilot with the 13th AAF in the South Pacific.

He was born in Raytown, Missouri, graduated from Santa Ana high school and Santa Ana Junior College in 1940.

Captain Jennings is credited with two Japanese planes and more than 200 hours of combat time. He holds the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters for meritorious achievement. He also received the Purple Heart, for injury received in combat some time ago. He was a a graduate as a fighter pilot from the Army Air Force School at Moore Field.

His father, Noel Jennings, lives in Santa Ana.

On Tuesday morning Mrs. Roy Hansen, an aunt, received a telegram from Noel Jennings,

that Captain Jennings had been killed in action, January 7, only a week before he was to leave for home on a six month leave. He was well known here. His father, also known in the community, having spent his early life here. A sister, Mrs. H. G. Short, lives at Grant Pass, Oregon.

August 3, 1944 Raytown News - Schoeller's Market entered three times in the last ten days. Made entrance through the west and north windows. Person seemed to be hungry.

August 24, 1944 Raytown News

Work to begin on new fire station, 25×30 feet of cinder blocks, fireproof, and large enough to store all of the equipment.

The site of the building is on the northwest corner of Smith Brothers place of business on 63rd street. The ground was given by Smith Brothers for the use of the fire fighting equipment.

Minor Smith is the Chief of the fire department and Harry Graham is his chief assistant. It is Smith's job to maintain the equipment and Graham is in charge of the personnel. As much as possible labor in the new fire station will be members of the volunteer crew but others are not barred.

MRS. LILLIE RICE 81, granddaughter of Col. Henry Brooking (RB Henry Brooking had no children. Many Brooking descendants forgot about his father, Alvan.She was thedaughter of Serena DeBord Pendleton) She was born in Clay County, Mo., September 2, 1863 the day following the evacuation of her parents from the command of Order 11. Mr. And Mrs. Pendleton returned six months later after they were forced to leave. She was the widow of the late Nathaniel Rice. Survived by daughter, Rena Rice Robey; three sons, Edward, Mason and Stanley; brother Marcus Pendleton and sister, Vyra Wilson. Brooking Cemetery: Nathaniel Rice Sept. 1854- Jan 2, 1910 Lillie Lee Pendleton Rice Sept. 2, 1863 - November 17, 1944 Children: Archie M. 1893-1896; Wallace 1895-1896; Lela Jane 1897-1898; Maud Lee 1891-1910.

A small blaze originated in an overheated gas heater, in the Cox building, housing the high school canteen, Cox and Son Pipe Line Shop.
