(Picture) Fire Sweeps Through Blue Ridge Methodist Church, 51<sup>st</sup> and Blue Ridge boulevard - The blaze is thought to have started near an overhead gas heater in the east end of the basement, at about ten forty-five o'clock in the morning. The alarm was turned in by Mrs. Russell Elliott, who lived near the church. She saw smoke seeping out from the building. By the time the fire trucks from the local department arrived and were ready for action the flame had burned through the east wall of the structure and enveloped the interior of the chapel. High winds fanned the blaze and the efforts of the firemen were confined to prevent spreading to other structures nearby. The church parsonage, only a few feet from the church, was prevented by burning as well as a new Sunday School structure just to the north..... 55 gallons of water were used to battle the flames, according to George Smith, fire chief.

The church, formerly known as Young's Chapel, was named after the founder, William Young, a presiding Methodist elder. First services were held in the old Cassell school. The first building was erected before the Civil War, using homemade bricks and slave labor. This building was replaced in 1907 by the structure destroyed last week.

Logan Jones, who was elected Police Judge, at the regular city election April 1, has been holding court in these offices, and in the future all council meetings are to be held in the new quarters. Since incorporation in July 1950, court sessions and meetings of the council have been conducted in the basement recreation room at the home of the mayor, Roy Cox.

With the establishment of permanent city quarters C. Lee Kenagy has announced that he will be in the city office with regular office hours for the transaction of regular business. Office hours are from 9:30 until 11 o'clock on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday; and from 2 until 4:30 o'clock on Thursday and Friday. All collections of taxes and other fees will be made here in the future, Kenagy stated this week. In the past the Clerk has used his home for that purpose, and while everyone has cooperated in an attempt to not disturb him, callers at home in unusual hours have been of some inconvenience. Either Mr. Kenagy or Mrs. Kenagy will be in the new quarters during office hours. City records will be filed in the new office ... The first collection of the city was July 1950 when Mayor Roy Cox paid a fee of \$1.50 for a permit to construct the structure housing the new office of the Missouri Public Service company here.
