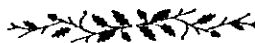

County, this State; William is an agriculturist of prominence in this county; Charles is cultivating a tract of land in Knox County, Mo., in which section John is also living; Benjamin is deceased; Warren makes his home in Florida, and is a traveling salesman; Elizabeth and Melissa are deceased; Susan A. is now the wife of J. P. Hiner, a farmer of Marion County; Berilla married W. B. Stevens and is living at Monroe City. Her husband is a retired farmer and for some time was the popular Clerk of Ralls County, Mo.

To our subject and his estimable wife there have been born thirteen children, as follows: Miss Emma F. makes her home with her parents; Susan is deceased; Harriet is the wife of W. B. Drescher, a retired merchant of Hannibal; Sarah is deceased; Benjamin is engaged in raising fruit in Florida; William departed this life while in California; Lillie is now Mrs. W. A. Bixler, and lives on a fine farm in Monroe County, Mo.; David B. is an agriculturist of prominence of this county; America is now deceased, and the remaining members of the family died in infancy.

The original of this sketch passed the first sixteen years of his life on his father's homestead in Virginia. The family came about that time to Missouri, his father purchasing land in this county and township, where Edward lived for two years after attaining his majority. He then began the battle of life for himself, his first employment being as a farm laborer. He worked for one man eighteen months and then spent the next year on the farm of his father-in-law. He then undertook to cultivate a tract on his own responsibility, renting property for two years. At the expiration of that time he moved upon a tract of forty acres which had been given him for services rendered and for fifteen years he was engaged in its cultivation. Then in company with his brother Robert he became the proprietor of his present farm, which comprised one hundred and twenty acres. They continued to work the place together for two years when our subject purchased his brother's interest and from that time until 1890 was engaged in its opera-

tion with good success. That year he sold out, but soon thereafter bought back fifty-one acres, upon which he makes his home at the present time. He has accumulated a sufficient amount of this world's goods to enable him to live in comfort and enjoy the fruits of his early years of toil. He is not connected with any church organization and in politics never fails to cast a vote in favor of Democratic candidates. Socially, he is a Mason of high standing and takes great interest in the work of that order. His life has been such that he has won and held the high regard of the people of his community, and indeed of the entire county, for he is widely known.

HON. JAMES H. UNDERWOOD. There is probably no man better known or more favorably held in the estimation of all the citizens of Ralls County, than is this gentleman, whose home is on Section 29, Township 54, Range 7. The confidence reposed in him was manifested in November, 1874, when he was elected Judge of the County Courts on the Democratic ticket. That position of trust and honor was ably filled by him for four years, during which time he was noted for his wise decisions, his clear discernment of human nature, and his knowledge of right and justice. He is pre-eminently a self-made man, and owes all that he now possesses to his own hard work for years past.

The Judge was born in Pike County, Mo., June 1, 1829, being a son of James and Elizabeth (Burbidge) Underwood, natives of Virginia and Kentucky, respectively. The father emigrated from Virginia to Kentucky while young and engaged in farming. He was married in Bath County, and continued to operate his farm in that vicinity until 1827, when he started with his family and household effects by wagon to Missouri. Arriving here he settled on what is now known as the "Chilton" farm in Pike County, renting this homestead for a year and a half. Then moving to the farm which is now owned by our subject,

he entered a quarter section of land, which was then thickly covered with timber. By the help of his sons he cleared most of the forests away and made numerous substantial improvements. As he could afford to do so, he purchased additional tracts of land, until at one time he owned four hundred acres. He took a lively interest in politics and public affairs, and enjoyed the friendship and respect of all with whom he had any business or social dealings. His death occurred in 1876, when he had survived his faithful and loving wife some twenty years. They were the parents of seven children, of whom Julia Ann, deceased, was the wife of Alvin Powell, now also deceased; Alfred died at the age of twenty-eight years, in 1848; Mary J. is the widow of Joseph D. Tatlow, and is a resident of Monroe County, Mo.; Martha died when in her eighteenth year; George M. passed away when sixteen years of age; J. H. is the next in order of birth, and Jehu died in infancy.

The boyhood of Judge Underwood was spent in a quiet, yet happy way on his father's farm, and during a part of each year, after arriving at a suitable age, he attended the district schools of the neighborhood. He was of great assistance to his father in managing the farm, which he helped to clear and increase in value. He continued to live with his father until the latter's death, and therefore inherited the home farm, where he has passed nearly a lifetime. The place comprises three hundred and eighty-eight acres, about two hundred and fifty acres of which is now under cultivation and finely adapted for raising corn, wheat, and other cereals, which are the principal products. The pleasant and substantial house in which the Judge makes his abode was erected by him in 1859.

On May 26, 1859, was celebrated the marriage of the Hon. Mr. Underwood and Miss Mary F. Phillips, a native of Oldham County, Ky., and a daughter of Isaac Phillips, who settled in Ralls County about 1857. The union of our subject and wife was blessed by six children, two of whom are deceased. Florence, the eldest, became the wife of William Culellan, of Texas; Katie E. and Leda live at home and keep house for their father;

Jessie married John McElroy, a farmer of Monroe County; Samuel L. died at the age of five years, and the youngest died in infancy, unnamed. The children have received good educational privileges and have attended the High School. Mrs. Underwood was summoned to the home beyond, February 7, 1879, leaving a wide circle of sincere friends who cherish her memory. Our subject is a member of the old school Presbyterian Church, and has always been prompt and ready to contribute money for religious and benevolent purposes.

ALEXANDER GOSNEY is one of the leading farmers and stock-raisers of Marion County, and makes his abode on his well-equipped homestead, which is located on Section 5, Township 56, Range 8. His life has been marked by the utmost honesty and fairness in all his dealings with others and thus he has constantly risen in the opinion of his neighbors and all those with whom he has come in contact. For many years he has been a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church and has embodied its exalted teachings in his daily performance of duties.

A native of Adams County, Ohio, our subject was born March 13, 1832, to David and Ann (Wilson) Gosney. The father was born in West Virginia in 1797 and in 1821 was married to Miss Wilson, who was born on the Eastern shore of Maryland, and whose death occurred November 4, 1875, when she was in her seventy-fifth year. Their union was blessed with five sons and four daughters, in order of birth as follows: Robert H., now a retired farmer of Lewis County; Elizabeth, deceased, wife of H. P. Shaw, also deceased; Sarah J., Mrs. R. M. Clarke, a resident of this township; James W., a retired farmer of Clarence, Shelby County, Mo.; Alexander; David, deceased; William F., who is engaged in agricultural pursuits in this township; Mary A., deceased; and Eliza M., who became the wife of Charles H. Gosney, who, though he bore the

Williams and Humphrey places, which join the Gibson farm. They now are retired. They live in Vandalia.

WOODS, HAROLD EDWARD, born 28 Sept 1898 at Center, died 22 Nov 1965, is buried at Fern Chapel. On 27 June 1923 he married Juanita Cole (26 Sept 1900), born at Center. They have 3 children: (1) Janice (5 May 1924), married John Nolan and their children are James E., Jennifer, Calista, John Wayne, David, and Phillip. (2) Naomi (2 Mar 1928). (3) Barbara, born 29 Jan 1931, married Wayne Weber, their children are Kenneth Wayne, Beth Ann, and James Keith. Harold Edward Woods was the son of Charles E. and Grace (Bailey) Woods. Juanita Cole is the daughter of George Cumberland Cole, a farmer, born 17 Sept 1861 at Eldred, IL, died 14 Jan 1953. George Cumberland Cole first married Hannah Cullen; their son was Justin Cole. On 24 Nov 1897 he married Katherine E. Underwood, born 1 May 1862 at Perry, died 11 Aug 1960. Both are buried at Lick Creek Cemetery; their children are Juanita and Florence (Mrs. Henry Galloway). George Cumberland Cole was the son of Rev. Richard Samuel Cole, minister, doctor and farmer, born 22 Dec 1817 at Stevensburg, VA, died 18 Dec 1896, buried at Fern Chapel. Rev. Cole first married Charity Buckman Lillie and their son was Richard Samuel Jr. She died, then Rev. Cole married Mary Philena Smead born 17 July 1829 at Waybridge, VA, died 12 Nov 1864, is buried at Pioneer, IL; their children: Carey Winfield, Millard Nathaniel, and George Cumberland. Mary Philena died and the Rev. Cole married Elizabeth Cox; their children: Thornton Mason and Rufus Robert. Rev. Cole was the son of William and Ellen (Samuels) Cole. Mary Philena was the daughter of Elisha and Deborah Smead. Katherine E. Underwood was the daughter of Judge James Harvey Underwood, born 1 June 1829 in Pike Co., died 27 June 1911. He was elected judge of the Western district of Ralls Co. in 1874 and served for four years. His family lived near Louisiana, Mo., when he was born; when they moved to the Perry vicinity, his mother carried him on horseback, since he was less than one year old. He married Mary Frances Phillips, born in 1839 at Oldham Co., KY, died 7 Feb 1879. They are buried at Underwood Cemetery. Judge Underwood was the son of James and Elizabeth Burbridge Underwood. Mary Frances was the daughter of Isaac and Katherine M. Durham Phillips. Other children of Judge and Mary Frances were: Florence Cullen, Jessie Lee McElroy, Mary Lida Ralls, Samuel, and a son who died in infancy.

WOOLLEN, JOHN WILLIAM, born at Sunnyside, on 24 Dec 1933, married Lula O'Donel, born at Hannibal. They have one son, James Woollen. The parents of John William Woollen were John James Woollen (died 10 Feb 1960) and Lena Ketsenburg. The parents of John James Woollen were William F. Woollen and Ruth Burrous (1858-1940), her parents were John and Sarah Burrous. The parents of Lena Ketsenburg were Mike and Mary Lehenbauer Ketsenburg. The parents of Lula O'Donel were Cam O'Donel (15 Mar 1873 - 24 Aug 1955), car inspector and farmer, and Edith Ann Russel, married in 1897. Their children: Loyd, Robert, Gladys Alexander, and Lula (above). The parents of Cam O'Donel were James O'Donel and Nancy Ann Caldwell (1852 - 1 Nov 1941); daughter of Amos and Elizabeth McCarthy Caldwell of Pike Co. Nancy Ann is buried in Buffalo Cemetery. The parents of Edith Ann Russel were John Travis Russel (7 Feb 1829) born in Warren, OH, and Margaret Pritchett (13 Sep 1850 in Pike Co. May 1913 in Pomeroy, WA). John Travis Russel was the son of John Russel and Emeline Adams.

WYBRANT, ROLLA HUGH, (10 May 1893), died in 1980, was born at Orrwood; married Adele Wasson in July 1921, she died in 1924, no children. He married 3 Nov 1925 in East St. Louis, IL, Gussie Wyan of Bunceton, (1895-1962). Was in the Air Force 1917-19, in Aug 1918 was commissioned Second Lieutenant; was a teacher; school superintendent; and farmer. His 5 children are: (1) Delores McWilliams (1927), Shelbina; has one son, Michael (1949) of Monroe City and he has a son, Randall Lee (1972). (2) Rolla H. Wybrant, Jr. (1928), Auxvasse, married Marjorie Ledford, daughter of Lester Ledford and Geraldine Dudley. They have 4 children, Susie (1955) married Carl Bedford, has 2 children, Diana and Justin; Cynthia (1956) (Mrs. Vernon Woods), Rolla; Daniel (1960), college student; and Randall Robert (1964). (3) Rosa Klein (1932), Syracuse, has 2 daughters, Jerry Lynn (1957), senior at Central Mo. St. U.; and Jane (1961), a college student. Sallie Towles (1867-1954), of Joanna. Their children: Rolla (above); Bon R. Wybrant (1895-1975); Venice Sankpill (1889-1950); and Mabel McKinzie (1891-1970). The parents of Samuel Wybrant were Hugh Wybrant, born Marietta, OH, and Margaret Guyler who died 1879, is buried at Olivet Cemetery. The parents of Gussie Wyan Wybrant were Robert Wyan (1849-1940), and Rosie Callahan (1872-1955); their children were Gussie (1895-1962); Florence Frame (1899) of Columbia; Jessie Chamberlain (1902), who lives in Coronado, CA; Lena Mische (1905) of Boonville, and Jacob, died in 1926.

YAGER, BOB E., (10 Jan 1924), Center, on 18 Feb 1945, married Lucille L. Isensee. Their children are David B. (10 Dec 1947) and Donald B. (21 Feb 1951). The parents of Bob Yager are Walter Bradford Yager (16 July 1897), and Hettie B. Lillard; their children are Bob (above) and Nancy (28 Feb 1926). See: *Yager, Walter Bradford*. The parents of Lucille Isensee were Fred C. Isensee (28 July 1886 - 11 June 1958), and Ida B. Meyer; their children were Lucille (1924), Fred Jr. (1916), and Ruth M. (1918). The parents of Fred C. Isensee were Fred L. Isensee (11 Feb 1861 - 26 Nov 1933), and Augusta Rischbieter (12 Dec 1862 - 26 Nov 1933), both born in Germany, died in St. Louis Co. The parents of Ida B. Meyer were Alfonso George Meyer (14 June 1868 - 5 July 1939), and Lucinda M. Howard (17 Aug 1874 - 9 June 1940); married 29 Oct 1893 in Douglas Co.; he was born in Germany, she was born in Douglas Co.

YAGER, CHARLES LEE, (20 Nov 1861 - 16 July 1942), born in Ralls Co., on 3 Dec 1885 married Ida Byron Norton (3 Dec 1865 - 28 Feb 1943). They are buried at Norton Cemetery near the Yager place. The parents of Charles Lee Yager were Joel Henry Yager and Margaret Fedella Settle. The parents of Ida B. Norton were William Bradford Norton and Susan Warren. The children of Charles Lee Yager and Ida Yager were (1) James Otis (28 Aug 1886 - Mar 1932), on 11 Mar 1912, married Mabel Ellen Moore, daughter of George and Lucy Mallory Moore. (2) Jesse L. (5 Jan 1888 - 30 Nov 1888). (3) Robert Estel (3 Dec 1890 - 30 Oct 1897). (4) Lulu Victoria (1 Apr 1893 - 11 Oct 1976), on 19 Aug 1918 married David K. Ingman, son of Abner S. and Margaret Hansbraugh Ingman. (5) Walter Bradford (16 July 1897) in 1920, married Hettie Lillard, daughter of David G. (24 Jan 1861 - 18 June 1949), and Nan Taylor Lillard. (11 July 1865 - 18 May 1939), married in Lewis Co. 27 Dec 1894; (6) Margaret Faith (7 Aug 1899), on 26 Dec 1929, married James A. Spalding, son of S. P. and Lulu Whaley Spalding. (7) Charles Byron (6 Sep 1902) married Georgia Ann Morris of Mexico, Mo. YAGER, WALTER BRADFORD, (16 July 1897), lives north of Center on the Yager place near Norton Bridge, on 28 Feb 1921 married Hettie B. Lillard (18 Apr 1899) who was born at Maywood. They have 2 children, Bob and Nancy. Walter Bradford was in military service in World War I. The parents of Walter Bradford Yager were Charles L. Yager (20 Nov 1861 - 16 July 1942) and Ida Byron Norton. Charles L. was born in Audrain Co. and is buried at Norton Cemetery near the Yager place. The parents of Charles L. Yager were Joel Yager (18 Oct 1826 - 7 Jan 1907) and Margaret Settle (27 July 1832 - 12 June 1924). The parents of Ida Norton were William Bradford (1822-1880) and Susan Warren Norton (1838-1878); their other children were Bob and Thomas. The parents of Hettie Lillard were David G. Lillard (24 Jan 1861 - 18 June 1947) and Nan Taylor (11 July 1865 - 18 May 1939), married in Lewis Co. 27 Dec 1894. He was born in Lewis Co., and was an auctioneer, is buried in Dover Cemetery in Lewis Co. Their other children: D. Taylor; Anna Jo; Roy Brooking; Sam; Lee Lillard. The parents of David G. Lillard were David E. Lillard (19 Sep 1840 - 18 May 1886) and Mildred Long; their children were Maggie, Sarah, Artemesia, and David G. The parents of Mildred Long were Gabriel and Elizabeth Brooking Long. Their other children were David, Margaret, Pink and John.

YAGER, WILLIAM HAROLD, (28 July 1909) lived in New London, deceased. Was a postal clerk, was president of the Missouri Federation of Postal Clerks. On 15 Nov 1935 he married Lucy Frances Glascock (21 Nov 1911); their 3 children are: (1) Harold Edward (16 Oct 1945), 1968 West Point graduate, was an Army Captain 6 years, married on 14 Aug 1971 in Cullman, AL to Marsha Kay Buchmann; Harold is now in business in Alabama.
