The Raytown Market Is All Dressed Up and Definitely Has Some Place To Go - Has a new entire interior paint job, 30% more floor space, fixtures have been moved about and new appliances added to the super market, a new refrigerated meat counter, walk in refrigerator in back of building at 63rd and Raytown road.

"The only old fixture left is Harry Grigsby, the genial 'butch' in charge of the meat department. Forrest Schoeller and Jim Benner started when the store closed moving about and painters and electricians came to install the new meat department, a new electric frozen vegetable counter. The store was closed on Monday to complete the change."

The new stop light at 63rd and Raytown road, November 24, 1949, created some confusion with the drivers, accustomed to fighting their way to cross the intersection, to stop for a red light.
