WILLIAM WHITE CALLED TO REST AT WASHINGTON

WELL KNOWN FORMER LOCAL
RESIDENT DIES ON
THURSDAY

Former State Legislator and
County Official—Graduate
of Wabash College

Washington, Dec. 24.—Former State Senator William M. White of Crawfordsville, Ind., known to hundreds of friends throughout Indiana as "Billy" White, died here at noon today in Georgetown hospital. He was 68 years old.

Stricken with an intestinal obstruction he had entered the hospital only yesterday afternoon, but his condition became so rapidly worse that surgeons could not perform the operation that was planned.

White, who was at one time actively identified with Indiana Republican state politics, had been employed in Washington for a number of years in the office of the alien property custodian.

His death, on the day before Christmas, comes under peculiarly sad circumstances. Members of his family are in California. Mrs. White, accompanied by their son, Russell White, went to Los Angeles several weeks ago for the improvement of her health. News of Mr. White's illness was sent to his family last night. A telegram of inquiry concerning his condition came from the son this afternoon, but Mr. White had died two hours before.

Arrangements for the funeral will not be completed until further word is received from the family, but it is presumed here the body will be taken to Crawfordsville for burial.

Senator James E. Watson and other Indianians have expressed sorrow over Mr. White's death. None had known of his illness, so word of his death came as a shock.

"Senator White, affectionately known to his many friends as 'Billy,' served with distinction in the Indiana legislature, and both for his ability and energy commanded the respect of his colleagues and all privileged to know him," commented Senator Watson. "His death away from home, is cause for sorrow among

hundreds of Indianians. He was a man of attractive personality, and ever popular with all who knew him."

William M. White, former state senator, who died today in a Washington hospital, was born and reared in Montgomery county. He attended the public schools here, and later was graduated from Wabash college, where he was a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity. He served as a reporter of Montgomery circuit court and later was elected county auditor. He served two terms in the Indiana General Assembly as senator. He was an active member of the Methodist Episcopal church. Several years ago he left this city to make his home in Washington, where he held a government position.

Surviving in addition to the widow and a son, Russell, who lives in Los Angeles, Calif., two sisters and a brother live in this city. They are Miss Pink White, Mrs. Laura Waldrup, and Charles E. White.

The body will be brought to this city from Washington where the funeral services and burial will take place.

The arrangements for the funeral await the arrival of the widow and the son from California who are now enroute here. The body will be taken to the home of the brother, Charles E. White, north Grant avenue. The remains are expected to reach here tonight.

tions over which British or French
public opinion might become aroused.

Reviewing the events leading up
to the situation, Pertinax said Brit-
ish and French plans were recently
evolved, both far apart, but both
based on United States cancella-
tion of the debts, but the vote in
congress radically altered the posi-
tions taken.

One point in common remained,
however, he said. That was the
urgent necessity to find an ar-
rangement whereby, while dispen-
sing Germany from payments to
them, her creditors would not be
obliged to pay, out of their own
pockets, sums due to the United
States.

America's debtors, it has been
observed, he said, could easily
solve the difficulty by invoking the
delay clauses in the contracts, but
examination revealed that this
would be inadequate. Great Britain,

LAST RITES FOR WILLIAM WHITE HELD AT TEMPLE

FRIENDS AND RELATIVES AT- TEND SERVICES FOR FOR- MER RESIDENT

Masonic Lodge Takes Part—Bur- ial Made In Family Lot at Oak Hill

Friends and relatives of William M. White, former Crawfordsville resident, who died suddenly in Washington last week, gathered at the Masonic Temple Wednesday afternoon where they paid their respects to the memory of this well known citizen.

From 12 o'clock (noon) until 2 o'clock, the hour of the service, the body lay in state at the temple where it was viewed by scores of persons.

Dr. John S. Ward, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, preached the funeral sermon, paying a high tribute to the deceased. Judge Edgar A. Rice of the Montgomery circuit court was in charge of the Masonic service. The burial was made in the family lot at the Oak Hill cemetery.

The body, which arrived here from Washington Monday morning, was first taken to the home of the brother, Charles E. White, north Grant avenue, where many friends paid their respects.

Mr. White, who spent the greater part of his life in this city, left Crawfordsville about ten years ago when he accepted a government position in Washington. Since that time he had made his residence in the nation's capital.

Prominently identified with the Republican party he served two terms as state senator and prior to his election to this office served here as court reporter and county auditor.

Mr. White was a member of the Methodist church and was a graduate of Wabash college. He also held membership in the Phi Delta Theta fraternity and the Masonic lodge.

The pall bearers for the services were: Frank C. Evans, T. C. Crabbs, Charles McClamroch, Arthur McCain, W. W. Goltra and Dumont Kennedy.

WIDOW OF FORMER STATE
SENATOR DIES AT GLEN-
DALE, CALIF.

Funeral Services and Burial Will
Be Held Here Tuesday
Afternoon

Mrs. Mattie White, widow of former State Senator William M. White and a native of Crawfordsville, died Friday night in Glendale, Calif., at the home of a sister, Mrs. Frank Gonzales, according to a message received here by relatives. Her death followed an illness lasting one week and was caused by a stroke of paralysis.

Mrs. White was 76 years old and spent most of her life in Crawfordsville. During her residence here she was identified prominently with the social and civic activities of the community. About ten years ago she moved to California and she then had made her home in Glendale.

The husband for several years was a prominent member of the Indiana state senate. Following completion of his service in the state legislature he was appointed alien property custodian at Washington, D. C., serving in this capacity until his death in 1931.

Surviving, besides the sister at whose home she died, are: one son, Russell White of Glendale, Calif., a brother, Seymour Detchon of Chicago, and a sister, Mrs. Charles McIntyre of Berkeley, Calif. Preceding her in death was a brother, Y. A. Detchon of this city.

The body will be brought to Crawfordsville Tuesday by the son and funeral services will be held at 3:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. I. A. Detchon, 313 east Wabash avenue. The Rev. Paul L. Benedict of the First Methodist church, of which the decedent was a member, will officiate at the rites, and burial will be made in the family lot at Oak Hill cemetery.

RUSSELL WHITE, WAR VET IS DEAD

FORMER RESIDENT OF CITY
SUCCUMBS AT HOSPITAL
IN LOS ANGELES.

Russell White, 49 years old, a native of Crawfordsville and a resident of this city for many years, died Wednesday at a Los Angeles, Calif. hospital according to a message received here by relatives.

Death followed a long illness and was reported to have been hastened by a throat infection.

A veteran of the World war, Mr. White was the son of the late William M. White and Mattie Dechon White the parents having been identified prominently with the civic and social life of Crawfordsville for many years.

The mother passed away in June, 1938, while the father, a former Indiana state senator, died in 1931.

Mr. White was graduated from the Crawfordsville high school and attended Wabash college. He was a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity.

The body will be cremated at Los Angeles and the ashes will be brought here for burial, the burial to take place at two o'clock Thursday afternoon in the family lot at Oak Hill cemetery with short funeral services at the grave.

WELL KNOWN RESIDENT OF
CITY, SUCCUMBS AFTER
EMERGENCY OPERATION

Charles Edward White, 73 years old, who for many years was identified with the hardware business of this city, died Tuesday afternoon at Culver hospital, following an emergency appendectomy. He was stricken Sunday and submitted to the operation a few hours after being admitted to the hospital.

A native of Montgomery county, Mr. White was born Nov. 2, 1867, the son of Henry Allen White and Margaret I. White, pioneer Indiana residents. He was married to Leona Bible, July 6, 1892, and lived on a farm until 1907 when he moved to Crawfordsville.

Mr. White was a member of the Masonic lodge, and during his residence in this city was associated with the Moon, Flamingam & Wischard hardware company, the Flamingam hardware company, and the Thomas Houlehan Hardware company.

Surviving are: one daughter, Mrs. J. Martin Shannon, two granddaughters, Beverly and Jo Anne Shannon, all of this city, two sisters, Miss Pink E. White of this city, and Mrs. Laura D. Waldrip of near Crawfordsville, and several cousins and nieces. The wife died in 1927, and a brother, William M. White, passed away in 1931.

Funeral services will be held at 10:30 o'clock Thursday morning at the home of the daughter, 309 Dubois avenue. Burial will be made at Shannondale at four o'clock Thursday afternoon.
