Each week items were listed that were on the ration list. Constantly, readers were asked to buy bonds to support our troops.

February 15, 1945 Raytown News

WILLIAM F. HALL Died Saturday. Lived here Fifty Years

William F. Hall, 78, died at his home Saturday morning, from the effects of a stroke he had several days ago.

Mr. Hall was born in Kentucky and came to Independence with his parents in 1887, then to a farm near here. Mr. Hall took part in the Sac and Fox land strip run in 1891, and lived in that area for more than a year before returning to Kansas City, from where he moved to Little Blue. He lived in Little Blue three years, in 1896 he moved to Raytown.

When he moved to Raytown it was to occupy the home at 63rd and Raytown Road, and it was in this home he died last Saturday morning, where he lived nearly fifty years, a well known and respected citizen.

He leaves his wife, Mrs. Lucy Hall; one daughter, Mrs. George E. Taylor, who incidently is the only one of a party of ten who came to this country from Kentucky; and a son, Harold H. Hall, both of Raytown.

August 23, 1945 Raytown News

Bob Bordner returned from Sheepshead Bay, New York. Had been given a medical disenrollment.

Sgt. Joe Clifton is now stationed in Gunsbury, Germany.

Sgt. Leon Bosse awarded Bronze Star medal.

Raytown was quiet on V-J-Day. All business establishments, including filling stations and drug stores locked their doors. Local grocery stores felt the buying urge as housewives were short of canned goods. Released from gas rationing families were planning vacations.

September 6, 1945 Raytown News

According to The News. who receives information from the Naval News Service: Jim Robinson, Seaman 3/o, took part in the last bombardment of the Japanese homeland while he was aboard the Destroyer USS Stoddard in Admiral Halsey's 3rd fleet. Strikes were also made against Chichi Jima in the latter part of the Okinawa campaign, this ship knocked down two Japanese planes.

Dedication of the Raytown Christian Church, Sunday 21, 1945. The present building was commenced in November 1943 and the congregation moved in Easter Sunday 1944.

The Raytown News, started in 1926, has had three homes: first, on Raytown road at a spot just north of 63rd street, later it moved into a specially built home one block west of Raytown road where it lived, which it outgrew, and moved it into the Cox building, 6213 Raytown road. None of the original equipment is being used now that Minor Smith's trucks moved twenty years ago. In the last fourteen years much of the old equipment has been replaced.

The present owner has been in charge since September 1931 when purchased from the estate of the late Earl D. Knox.
