James Stillman.<sup>14</sup> "Mary Cassatt not only furthered, in fact, almost created an interest in French Impressionism, but also rediscovered El Greco."<sup>15</sup>

So Mary Cassatt did not start, plan and organize the movement like Morisot, but her own works and the push of her personality did much to further the cause of the Impressionist era.

Marie Quieveron Bracquemond was not as well stationed in life as Morisot or Cassatt so her formal training was somewhat limited. She was admitted to the distinguished Ingres' Studio, "Where she gained the reputation of being one of his most intelligent pupils."<sup>16</sup> Bracquemond also spent hours in the Louvre copying the great masters which taught her the methods of these great artists.

Marie's work was admired by Manet and Renoir who influenced her to work "plain-air."<sup>17</sup> Although Felix, her husband, hated the Impressionism, he must have thought her work valuable, for his jealousy of her work was often displayed. This hardship at home finally made her almost totally stop working. She did show in three Impressionist shows where she was "Well received by contemporary critics."<sup>18</sup>

**MR. J. M. BUSH—Dear Sir:**—I have just returned from Pittsfield where I was present on the 15th inst, at a late hour of the day, with a small portion of the Townshp Assessors of this county, who had met for the purpose of forming a basis of assess-ment in the county. This basis they had formed when I arrived and to it I made no demur, thinking it to be a mere farce. However, I obtained a copy of the same, which I here give for the benefit of the people:  
 1st, Horses from \$40 to \$60; 2d, cattle from \$8 to 12; mules from \$10 to 60; sheep 50 ct; hogs \$1 per hundred pounds; carriages and wag-gons \$40 or 1-3 the value; pianos \$300 to 3,75; amount of domestic ani-mals and unnumbered articles 1-5; value of money and credits 1-3; av-erage value of merchandis 1-5; val-ue of property owned as a broker 1-5; value of materials and manufactured articles owned as manufactured 1-3; money invested in bonds 1-8.

Now this is a now idea to me—that if a man has \$3000 in money, that we only assess \$1000—or if a merchant has \$5000 invested in goods, that we assess him \$1000—or if a man has a good note well secured with interest for \$3000, that we assess \$1000—or if a man has a fine horse worth \$500 or a \$1000, that we assess him at \$60, and so all through the chapter. If a man has got money on hand or good notes, let us assess it at the full amount, for that is just what it is worth in cash. If a man has a horse that is of great value, assess him in proportion to his value—or if he has a poor horse, assess him at its value; and so with all other property; and my candid opinion is that we never will have equal assessments till every assessor comes to that point—to as-sess everything at its cash value.— That is the law and that is what we are sworn to do. Now we have just so much money to raise as a Revenue, and if we assess at full value we fix the percentage to make the amount; and if we assess at half the value we have to double the percent. Asses-sing at the full value and that alone, will give equality in assessments.

**OBITUARIES.**

Died at his residence, six miles south of Pittsfield, on the 31st day of March, 1868, Elder James Burbridge—aged 84 years. His father, Rowland Burbridge, emigrated from Virginia to Kentucky in the early set-tlement of that State, with seven sons and three daughters and participated in the Indian wars and perils of that day. One of the brothers was captured by the Indians and was retained by them for five years, and then escaped and reached home impaired in health and survived but a few years. James—the subject of this sketch—was afterwards ap-prenticed to learn the Tanning and Currying trade in Ohio, and continued to follow the business most of his time until 1844. He re-moved to this county in 1838, and has resided here ever since. He early in life embraced Christianity, and united with the reformation of that day, and remained a zealous and ac-tive member of the Christian Church until his death. Though deprived of an education, he, after becoming a christian, spent all of the Lord's days and a portion of each week in preaching Christ and Him Crucified to his fellow men, with a zeal, energy and power seldom excelled, and continued so to do as long as he was able to walk or ride; thou-sands yet living will credit their conversion and reconciliation to the Savior to his power-ful exhortations. There are but few men of whom it can be said he had no enemies, yet the writer of this has never heard of an enemy of the deceased if he had any, and those who know him best accord to him per-fection in an great degree as a mortal man is capable of attaining in this life. For several years past he was severely and painfully afflicted with erysipelas in his legs, produc-ing constant and severe suffering, which was borne with christian fortitude and without a murmur. His constant prayer continued to be that "God would in His own good time take him from this painful State to a better one." Of him it may be truly said "Bless-ed are the dead that die in the Lord." He leaves three children and a large circle of friends to mourn his loss. H.

It is only about 1½ miles due east of the village of Martinsburg and best reached from Pittsfield by going south on the Nebo blacktop road to the Independence Church, turn right and go about 1 3/4 mile to the first cross road, turn left and go south about 3/4 mile.
